KAISER'S KNEE.

NOTICE.

ON and after the 14th day of June now present, it shall be unlawful for any person not being resident of this Colony, or having a fixed place of domicile therein, to take or fish for any Salmon, Sea Trout, Quananiche, Trout, Char, or any Fishes inhabiting or resorting to the Inland Waters or Estuaries of this Colony or its Dependencies; unless such person shall have taken out a License in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Game and Inland Fisheries Board.

Any person violating this provision of the Law will be rigorously prosecuted.

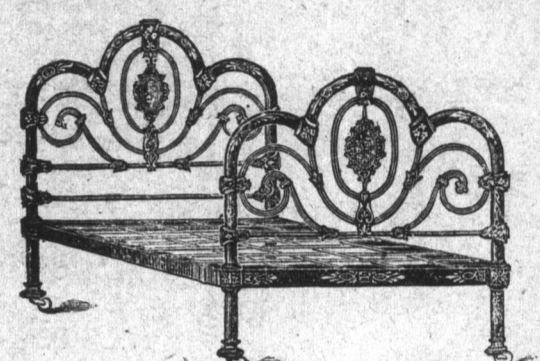
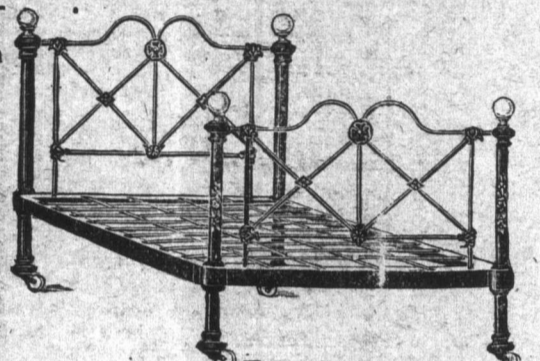

Placentia Notes.

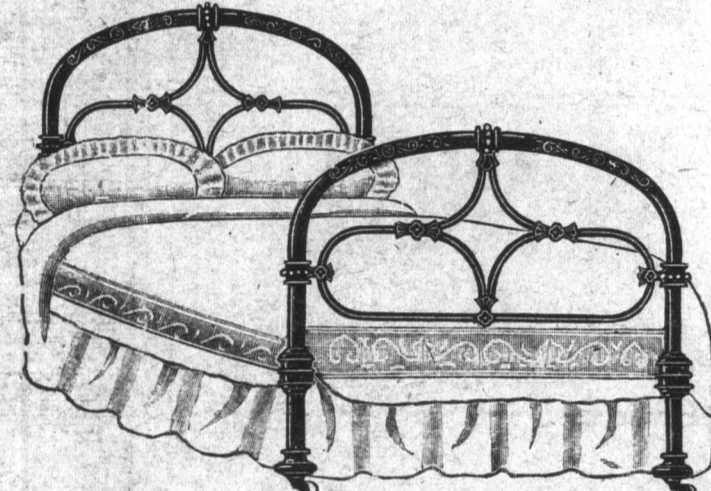

Wedding Bells.

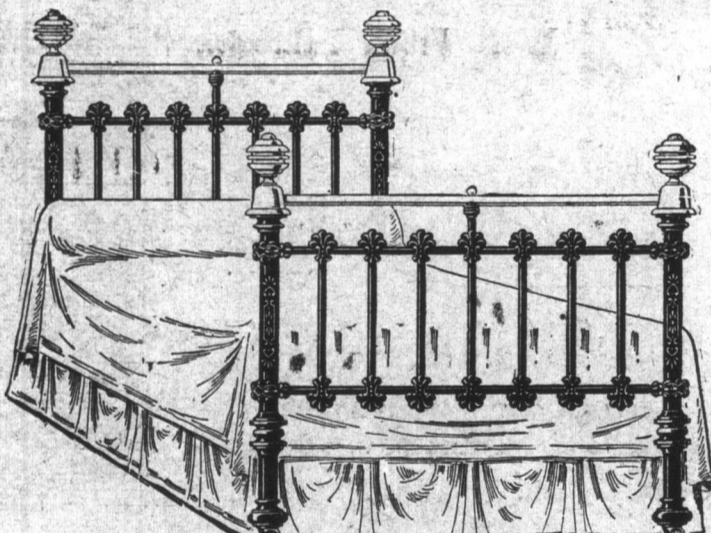
Editor Evening Telegram:

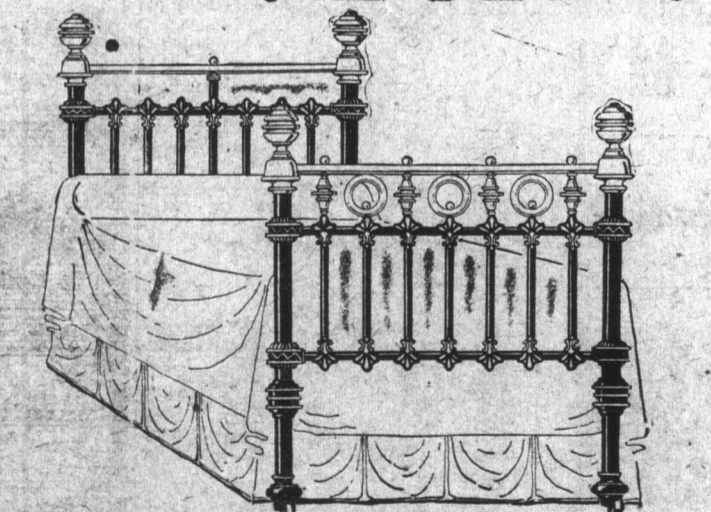

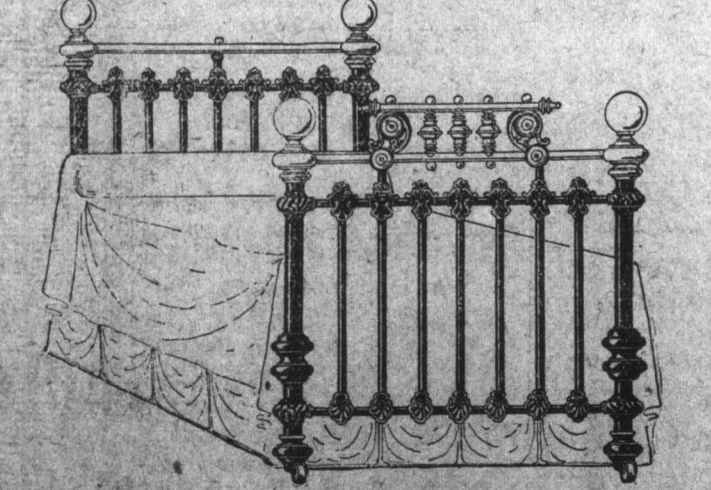

The Newfoundland Case Before the Hague.

The history of the agreement made between Great Britain and the United States in 1818, known in diplomacy as "The Convention of Ghent," is very interesting. It is well known that the war with America was brought on by the obstinacy of George III. Pitt, Fox, Burke and all the leading minds of the day were bitterly opposed to hostilities. Naturally in 1818 there was a strong desire to conciliate the young Republic. The first contention of the American negotiations was rather startling. They claimed to be put at once as regards the fisheries precisely in the same position as when they were Colonists. It was pointed out to them that they had cast off their allegiance to Great Britain and were now an independent foreign nation. It was all to no purpose; they persisted in putting forward this monstrous demand. The negotiations came to a deadlock. The Liberals in England were most anxious to please America, and the result is the Convention of Ghent.
 In construing this agreement it must always be borne in mind that the business carried on by Americans and contemplated by this Convention was a ship fishery and not a shore fishery off the Newfoundland coast. All the Americans fishing off the coast of Newfoundland and the Magdalen Islands were bankers.
 The questions at issue before the great international Tribunal are five.
 1. The Convention gives liberty to inhabitants of the United States only to catch fish off the Newfoundland coast. The Americans claim that they can ship men of any nation. The wording of this section is too clear to need discussion; only actual inhabitants of the United States can exercise this right.
 2, 3 and 4 are very clear.
 Under No. 2 the Americans refuse to pay light dues.
 3. They claim that Newfoundland can make no laws without their consent to regulate the fishery and prevent its destruction.
 4. That they are not bound to enter and clear their vessels at the local Custom Houses.
 All these four questions are ruled by the principle of sovereignty. No international jurist has any doubt about these three points. The only possible limitation to these three rules is that they must be exercised in a reasonable way and without discrimination.
 5. Under the Convention the United States fishermen have a right to fish on the coasts of western and southern Newfoundland. At Labrador they have much more extended privileges on the coasts, bays, harbours, creeks, &c.
 There is a clear distinction between their rights in both countries. Our contention that "coasts" of Newfoundland means the outer coasts and not the inner bays, creeks, coves, &c., is very clear. It is strengthened by the wording of the Convention, "Wood and water, shelter from storms, repairs," &c., and confirmed by the usage and practice of the period when the agreement was made. Americans at the time were all bankers, and to this fishery the Convention and its provisions applies only as regards Newfoundland.
