She will call in here on her way to get supplies and possibly some repairs. Other schooners also are still on the corst fishing.

The schooner H. M. Gardner, Capt Penny, which ran on the rocks at Change Islands, last Monday, has been floated off successfully and taken to Change Islands. She is not leaking and will be sailed home the first favourable opportunity.

Steamer Wrecked.

Passengers by the S. S. Glenco ow in the city say that the schooner Jubilee, which arrived at St. Lawrence, coal laden from Sydney, a couple of days ago after a passage of days on the run had an awful time of it, and the wonder is she did not founder. The deals which were picked up at St. Lawrence, Lamaline, Lawn and other parts of the S. W. Coast are very heavy and do not look as if they had been cut in this country. The Jubilee, when about 20 miles off the coast, was sailing through them for fully 5 hours. She eports that while in the Gulf of St. Lawrence during the night of the storm she passed a large steamer whose decks were piled with lumber and deals. The ship which evidently was from some Canadian port was making very bad weather and was deeply laden. The vessel evidently lost her deck load or foundered, and the belief is that these deals are a part of her cargo. The Jubilee was not near enough to get the name of the steamer, but she was a large three masted vessel. The Jubilee which was bound for St. Pierre but put in at St. Lawrence received a terrible buffeting. The sea ran mountains high and the wind blew with the velocity of a hurricane. The vessel was for the better part of 8 days hove to, and had to drift before the blast. Her foremast was carried away, the main beom smashed, the jaws of the main gaff broken, while the only sails left on her were the mainsail and large jib, all the rest having been torn in to shreds by the force of the wind. Portion of the deck was started by the working of the mainmast before it went by the board, and it is surprising that the vessel did not founder. Water got into the hold and the crew had to work the pumps often to try and keep her free. The foremast is also sprung, and it was only by the most skilful seamanship that she was nursed into port. She will be towed to St. Pierre by the tug "St. Pierre." The bankers Percy Roy and Cora

arrived at St. Lawrence off the Banks. Wednesday, with their dories smashed up and their sails either completely gone or torn into tatters.

Took Open Air Treatment.



Secured 31 Whales.

By the Prospero we learn that the whaler Hawk, which is operating at Cape Charles, has 31 whales captured up to date. This time last year the ship had 50 fish ashore, and for the season she secured 54. For three weeks past, owing to stormy weathon the search for fish, and her catch this year may not be over 40, as the er, the vessel has not been able to go many more.

Schooners Come to Grief.

By the Prospero we learn that it the big storm of Monday the schr Torpedo, owned by John Cook, of this city, became filled with water in straining in the heavy sea, as her seams opened when off St. Julien's and she had to be abandoned. The crew at the risk of their lives had to leave the vessel in boats, and after a desperate struggle with wind and tide rowed safely into St. Julien's. where the Prospero took them on board and brought them here. In the gale the vessel had all her canvas carried away, both her booms smashed in pieces, the foremast was sprung near the deck, and to stay by her for any length of time meant courting death. The crew lost a considerable portion of their clothing and effects. On Monday also a schooner owned by John Walsh, of Coachman's Cove. went ashore at Belle Isle in the Straits and was badly battered by the ligh sea which ran. The vessel partd her anchors, but before she did so he crew left her and landed safely n their boat. They were landed at friquet by another vessel and wer aken home by the Prospero.

Gas for lighting purposes can be egions of Canada, where sawdust is heap and plentiful, many towns and The mode of production is the same as is used for coal gas. The saw dust is baked in retorts, and yields 'rem twenty to thirty thousand cubic feet of gas per ton.

What is known as wood-meal fodder for cattle is just sawdust, mixed into a mash with hot distillers' wash and flavoured with rock salt. It can te fed to the beasts in its fresh state, or it can be dried and pressed into moulds like oil-cake, or it can be baked in the form of dough. Similar sawdust dough is made into bread, and eaten by the peasants in some parts of Russia and Germany.

Mortar made from sawdust is now largely used in building operations. In fact a house could almost be built of sawdust throughout, for there is sawdust stocco on the market, and all kinds of imitation wood is made of sawdust, from plain deal planks to the most elaborate oak and mahogany mouldings, ornamental doors,


