LATEST War News

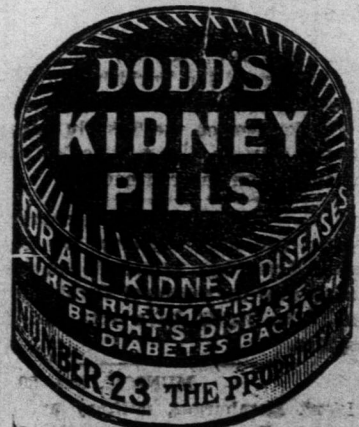

LONDON, To-day.

The silence of Sofia concerning the great battle in Thrace has at least been broken. A brief dispatch, announcing a Bulgarian victory and the capture of Lule Burgas only news yet available and still leaves the situation rather obscure. The message from Sofia apparently refers to earlier events, while the dispatch of Mazim Pasha, Turkish Minister of War, describes two battles, one sortie from Adrianople in the direction of Marsova and the other in the direction of which it must be inferred that engagements are extending over a long front. The Sofia dispatch sent long before the capture of Lule Burgas was known, throws new light on the disposition of the Turkish forces. It is evident earlier reports of the taking of this Erskini River, with a second line from Demotica to Lule Burgas. Both sides claim a victory but there is no reason to doubt that the Turkish second line of defence has been broken. Up to the present Bulgarian official dispatches have been more reliable than Turkish.

Evidence of immense efforts on part of Powers to intervene in favour of peace comes from official sources. A pronouncement of the Bulgarian position is published in a semi-official newspaper Mili, which plainly declares the Allies must not be deprived of the fruits of victory. Churchill speaking at Sheffield delivered some remarks, relating to Balkan events. He expressed a fervent hope that when the war was ended, the nations would be found united in the resolve that about Balkan difficulties there should never be another war, and that the long dismal chapter of human misery, unfolded in that region of the world should be one way or another be closed once and for all. There happily were signs, he said, that all the Powers were honestly striving to put an end to a long, fierce and disastrous struggle, and secure a settlement just to the interests and beneficial to the populations concerned.

Harbor Grace Functions.

Under the most favorable circumstances the formal opening of the Marine Slip and Agricultural Exhibition took place at Harbor Grace yesterday and the ceremony was one long to be remembered in the annals of the Bay Metropolis.

About sixty passengers arrived there including Sir Ralph and Lady Williams, Miss Dean and Premier Morris who were in a private car, and the whole party were at their destination by 11 a.m. The C. C. C., under Col. Kennedy, and the K. E. B., under Col. Rogers, were drawn up at the station to receive the visitors who, as they stepped out of the train, were greeted with the National Anthem discoursed by the massed bands of both Brigades. His Excellency then inspected the lads, and later went to the slip inspecting the machinery, etc. The Lunenburg sloop, H. B. Montague, with 2,800 qtls. of fish on board, was on dock and the Governor started the machinery to move the slip into the water.

His Excellency then declared the slip open. After which the visitors repaired to the residence of Mr. H. H. Archibald and partook of luncheon.

In the afternoon the Agricultural Exhibition was opened in Coughlin Hall. Mr. H. H. Archibald presided and called upon the Minister of Agriculture to speak. Hon. S. Blundford. He said that it was the fourth time that he had the pleasure of attending the opening of an Agricultural Exhibition at Harbor Grace and had been informed that such Exhibitions were successfully held at Harbor Grace for the last fifty years. He went on to congratulate the Agricultural Society on the splendid Exhibits produced and congratulated all interested.

His Excellency the Governor was the next speaker and gave a fluent and interesting address. He said the first time he addressed the people of Newfoundland it was on Agriculture and that this would be his last time to address them on the same subject.

"I have visited the Colony everywhere, with the exception of a few miles on the south of the Island. I wanted to know what the people and what the country was like, and now I know. There are parts of Newfoundland that will compare with any part of the world. Such beautiful places as Hermitage Bay, Mortier Bay and Bonne Bay, ought to attract large numbers of visitors. But they do not know of these beauty spots. And then again I found out by working around from one settlement to another what the people are, not only as the representative of the King, but as a man amongst men I have always been welcomed, perhaps not at first to all places, and my time in Newfoundland has been to me the happiest time of my life. Everywhere I have experienced nothing but kindness. I now have the good feeling of the people, and I hope that I shall retain it long after the time when I shall cease my work amongst you."

Premier Sir E. P. Morris was then introduced, thanked the Committee for the invitation given, paid a tribute to the Governor for the interest he evinced in the work and congratulated the people of Harbour Grace on the prosperity evident in the town and showed the possibilities of the slip as a labour giving enterprise. He predicted that Harbour Grace would become in the future a large manufacturing centre: spoke of the boat and shoe and other industries in the place, showed the necessity for cattle, sheep and poultry raising and dwell on the amount of money which such enterprises would conserve to the country. He hoped that the inauguration of remunerative industries would check the tide of emigration of the youth of the country and promised Government help towards the prosperity of the people, concluding by thanking the people for their kindness and hospitality.

The Chairman then addressed the gathering after which an address of welcome was presented to His Excellency.

After the formal opening His Excellency and party went to the Court House where a reception was held after which the train started on the return and reached the city at 11 last night.

Obituary.

The death occurred on Tuesday last, at his residence, South Side, of Mr. Richard Carberry, at the age of 68 years. Mr. Carberry was a carpenter by trade, was a man well liked in the community for his many good qualities. He was a life long member of the British Society, in which institution he took a deep interest. To his sorrowing family and relatives the Telegram extends its condolence.

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Champion Defeated.

Paris, Oct. 23.—Billy Papke, the middle-weight boxer of Illinois, tonight defeated the French champion Georges Carpentier, who quit after the 17th round.

A great crowd thronged the Cirque de Paris, hundreds of women being present. In fact, they were most enthusiastic supporters of Carpentier in the few rounds when he had the better of Papke and the most sympathetic mourners when Carpentier's hopes were dead.

At the weighing-in at 3 o'clock in the afternoon Papke exceeded the middle-weight limit, while Carpentier was under weight. The Frenchman's manager immediately claimed the title of middle-weight champion. He said: "The fight will proceed as arranged, but it will not be for the title, which now belongs to Carpentier."

It was evident in the first few rounds that Carpentier was no match for Papke, whose infighting tactics completely baffled the Frenchman. But he fought with great pluck and determination. At the end of the eighth round Carpentier's right eye was closed.

In the 14th the Frenchman came back quite strong, and in both that round and the 15th gave a good account of himself. Papke opened the 17th with a terrific hook to the jaw, which practically finished the Frenchman. Carpentier gamely got to his feet and managed to drag out the round, but obviously he was unable to continue, and after a brief consultation with his seconds he gave up. Papke receives \$5,000 for his end of the purse, with certain other emoluments. He had to pay a forfeit of \$1,000 to Carpentier for overweight.

Death of Capt. Kennedy.

By to-day's train we regret to learn of the death of Capt. John Kennedy at his home in Carbonear. Capt. Kennedy had been suffering from a sore leg for some time past, blood poison developed and he came here and went to Hospital for treatment but only remained a short while. After he returned home he gradually sank and death was the outcome. Capt. Kennedy was a man of sterling worth and was noted for his affable and kindly temperament. He was a pioneer planter on the Labrador and was one of the best fish killers out of Carbonear. Capt. W. J. Kennedy is a son of the deceased and Mrs. Bowman, of New Gower Street, this city, is a relative. To the sorrowing family the Telegram extends its condolence.
