**REVOLUTIONS.**

There is always a doubt about the permanent effect for good of a revolution that seeks by force to overturn existing conditions. The lasting reforms of our world seem rather to have been the result of evolution. Of course underlying it all is the same feeling of revolt and it only means that the pent up feelings of sincere men overcome their discretion in thinking that the time is opportune to strike. There is something very pathetic always in revolutions, especially those which cannot succeed, and in the putting down of which many people acting with sincere and pure motives are classed and executed with their leaders who are mainly responsible. We all have our periods of revolt, and while some are minor matters to which we object yet, they are in essence the same as for instance, revolutions against powers and principalities. It is something of an expression of the free speech and liberty that is the pride of Britons. When it is expressed by peaceful means it is respected by the authorities in so far as it has public opinion behind it and even then we unfortunately have had cases in history and in our own times where the interests of money and "class" have been sufficient to block a popular opinion.

However, uprisings aided by force, very often retard progress, and create, however just their cause, a greater prejudice against their object. But as I have said there are souls who are burning with the fire of honest opinions, and some of the brightest spirits the world has ever seen, who cannot restrain their noble rage, and press on with hearts aglow to fight for right as they see it. The great regrettable feature about the Sinn Fein uprising is the German hand shown in it. Otherwise it is only an expression of the unrest that has been gathering in Ireland for the last half century. Maybe the best thing that could happen to Ireland would be a Home Rule in every sense of the term. Responsibility sometimes has the effect of adding some conservative qualities to the broadest Radical, and with the total disarmament of Irish factions, Redmond, Carson and the Sinn Feiners ought to be able to work peacefully together as certainly the good of Ireland must be their common aim.

The Germans are our enemies now, but don't let our vengeance get beyond us and make us talk of ostracizing German trade after the war. This is a species of action that will prolong war indefinitely. Mr. Hughes the Australian Prime Minister, wants a movement for "getting ready" to fight the Germans commercially. But there are many men who doubt if it is a possible policy when the war is over.

**CULTIVATE HATRED.**

Sir Hugh Bell says: "When the war is over and life returns to a normal course, can it be doubted that the best way for all parties will be to obliterate with all possible speed the horrible injuries it has inflicted? Not to stimulate and excite angry feelings, but to calm them, should be our object. Will a policy which seeks to exclude Germany from the comity of nations and from the markets of the world have that effect? Would any reasonable moralist desire to cultivate hatred? Would he not rather wish to allay it in every way in his power?"

### Fabre Liner Was Not Chased

**BY COMMERCE RAIDERS.**

New York, May 8.—The report that the Fabre liner steamer Venezia was attacked and chased by two German commerce raiders and submarines in mid-sea on May 1, was denied to-day by Captain Bonifacio, the shipmaster. In making his report to the Fabre line office, and to Captain Gaunt, the British naval attaché.

Captain Bonifacio said that two steamers were sighted in mid-sea, that flashes of gun-fire were seen, that two small boats, apparently tenders, were observed, but the nearest the Venezia got to either of the ships was about four miles, and that neither of the ships paid any attention to him.

Captain Gaunt, in reporting to the British Admiralty, stated his belief that the two ships sighted were either French or British converted cruisers guarding the steamship line, were evidently engaged in target practice and were employing the tenders in observing and placing the targets.

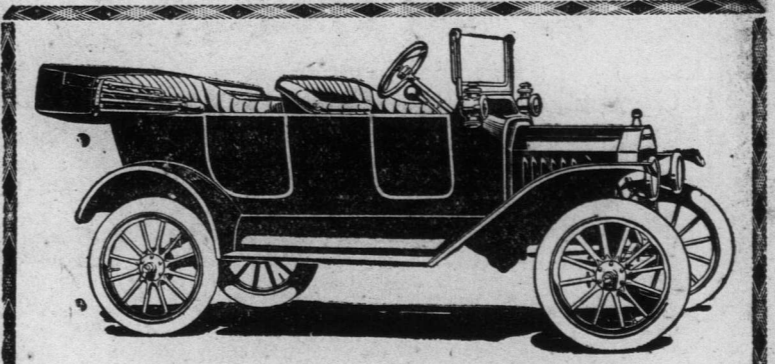
