FIRST MEETING OF RUSSIAN STATE COUNCIL

MOSCOW, To-day. The State Council, which promises mportant results to the National life of Russia, opened at 3 o'clock this afternoon in the Grand Opera House with that solemnity and old Russian pomp characteristic of Moscow, Despite a one day strike proclaimed by he Bolsheveki in protest against the council as a counter-revolutionary expression, the city is quiet. A few ttempts by the Bolskeveki in the treet to organize demonstrations vere similiarly suppressed by the rowds. No serious incident occured; precautions were taken against isorders of all descriptions and the Council's threats show a rigor in this espect unknown even in anti-revoluionary days. The building in which the Council is meeting is surrounded y a chain of soldiers with an officer very few yards, the soldiers being icked men from regiments of Signal orps or Cadets training for officers. he Chambers under the building are ccupied by soldiers with fixed bay ets. Members and invited guests efore being admitted have their tickets examined by nine different military posts. Premier Kerensky and other members of the Provisional Government occupied the stage and vere faced by General Alexieff and crussiloff, former Commander-in-Chief of the Russian Army, and other military officers in the Emperor's box. ief of the Army, but it is expected will attend the Council to-morro The proceedings began with a speech by Premier Kerensky lasting an hour and a half, pronounced in a nervous in ressive voice which aroused tremendous applause, mainly from that part of the theatre occupied by democratic organizations and members of the Cabinet, but Duma members and Moscow Industrial Deputies at times participated. He spoke resolutely emphasizing the part he played in recent events and his determination to play in events in the future. The Premier was greeted with wild applause when, early in his speech, speaking of the dangers from the extreme left, he declared that all at tempts with armed force against the people's power will be crushed with blood and iron. Much applause greeted him when, hinting at counter revolutionary military conspiracy, he exclaimed: "Let them be warned who think the time has came when, relying on the bayonet, they can overthrow our revolution." The audience rose and cheered this expression for five minutes. Kerensky rebuked the Finlanders and other seceding nationalities, his words evoking enthusiasm There was a menacing note in his voice when he declared that their pretensions proved the success of the evolution. 
