

The nvestigation deduces tlat there is no such thing as an "American standard of living." in the sense of a "very superior standard giving all the necessaries, many of the comforts, and a goodly supply of the luxuries of life." The "American standard" has been a convenient and plausible idea to evoke in comparing living conditions in America with those of Europe; but now that nearly 13,000 family schedules have been obtained from seventy-one large cities and twenty small cities and towns in the United States, and the figures compared, the "standard of living" ap parently vanishes and, instead, one finds many "standards," according to the income of the families.



One never ceas-



es to read helpful articles on how to make money or how to save it, which are of course good But why not more on the third branch of the subject,-how to spend, money. On first thought it seems as if anyone c o u l d spend money if he only had it

But not successfully, not as an art. "Savoir vivre" is the art of living, and since how we spend our money determines the material end of how successfully is a main branch of this supreme art of "savoire vivre."

It is often said that we Americans are first in the art of making money and last in the art of spending it The older civilizations have built up a better technique in the art of living and spending.

But They Had Learned the Art of Living.

Now there is in our town a certain family who once had much money and lived for many years abroad. Then they lost it and came back to us. And not to their beautiful home but to an upstairs apartment in a rather unattractive two apartment house. And yet so thoroughly had they learned the art of living that they would not let their change of circumstances make life ugly. They immediately built a screened-in porch on the best side of their house long before the day when screenedin porches were commonplace (ir fact, I think theirs was the first in town). They curtained this porch where necessary, furnished it attractively, (in those days porches used to be furnished with three rockers and a rustic table) had the electricity connected, put in the first Glocester hammock seen in town, and proceeded to live on the porch. That does not sound so much nowadays when these things are com monplace but then it was a revela tion of "savoir vivre."
