fighting is reported.

LOCKOUT EXTENDS.
LONDON, April 23.

The Engineering Employers' Feder-
ation has instructed its members to
hold out notices in operation which
will last 400,000 men will be idle in
the time, in addition to 250,000
men of the Amalgamated Engi-
neers already out. The agreement
between the employers asked the men to
propose a great measure of man-
ual control and the right to review

wage conditions. While there was no
difficulty about the principle involved,
the men demanded the meaning of the
phrase 'material changes' which the
employers claimed they were entitled
to introduce into the shop practice.
The employers replied that was a mat-
ter for them to decide.

A CHALLENGE TO FREE STATERS.
DUBLIN, April 22.

Conditions on which the dissen-
sion of the Irish Republican Army
is prepared to discuss the attainment
of unity of the army has been com-
municated to the Secretary of Dail.
Maintenance of the existing republic
is asked in the conditions which set
forth among other things that Dail
Eireann, as the Republic's Govern-
ment, be the only Government; that
the army be maintained as an Irish
Republican army, under control of an
elected and independent executive;
that the Civic Guard be disbanded and
the country policed by the Irish Re-
publican Army, as decided by the
executive; that Dail discharge all fi-
nancial liabilities of the army, and meet
its future requirements and that no
elections be held while the threat of
war by England exists.

GENOA MORE HOPEFUL.
GENOA, April 24.

Once more to-day the gyrating Genoa
Conference which has been alternating
between fears and hopes, and punctu-
ated by the political crisis which
threatened to destroy it altogether, set
itself firmly to the task of readjusting
the economic life of Europe. The an-
nouncement by the German delegates
last night that they would not reply
to the Allies' second note, because they
did not wish to endanger the success
of the Conference, was received every-
where with frankly uttered words of
relief for almost everybody was be-
ginning to despair secretly, if not out-
spoken, that the Conference would end
not in economic achievement, but
rather in a political turmoil. In all
quarters to-day were heard words of
praise for the patient efforts of the
Italian leaders to re-establish har-
mony so that the Conference might
concentrate upon the constructive prob-
lems for which it was organized.
