Dear Sir—I regret that I have not the leisure time that Mr. Michael J. James appears to have to go into a long discussion on the pros and cons of the case between us, so will merely append the report of Mr. John D. Roche, Ex-Forest Ranger Quebec Government and Woodlands Manager for Messrs. Burt C. Crittisinger, Inc., Niagara Falls, N.Y., who accompanied me on the trip to Stag Bay, Labrador, and which speaks for itself. I have other reports still more drastic made by Mr. N. H. Haber, of Lowville, N.Y., Mr. James E. Cannan of Utica, N.Y., Mr. J. G. Hoffman of New Hartford, N.Y., Mr. D. S. Moynahan, of Mohawk, N.Y., and Mr. Richard W. Edwards, of Jordan, N.Y., all practical lumbermen of long experience, and all of whom also accompanied me and who unanimously condemn the "Stag Bay Limits" as utterly impractical from every viewpoint even more strongly than Mr. John D. Roche does.

MR. ROCHE'S REPORT.

(Copy.)

Montreal, Que., Aug. 10, 1921.

To H. C. Bellew, Esq., et al.
Montreal, Que., and
The Hoffman Lumber Co., et al.,
Utica, New York.

Gentlemen:—

I have the honor to report that on the 11th of July Mr. Bellew phoned me to my house, and asked me to meet a party of Americans from New York State, who were proceeding to Labrador Coast on a timber limit investigation and asked me to accompany them. I answered that I would meet his party at Queen's Hotel, Montreal, at 11:30 the 12th of July, and talk the matter over. On the 13th as promised I met Mr. Bellew at Queen's Hotel, where he introduced to me Messrs. Richard Edwards, agent, of Jordan, N.Y.; Northan Haber, manufacturer and lumberman, of Lowville, N.Y.; Denis Moynahan, of Mohawk, N.Y.; J. G. Hoffman, New Hartford, N.Y., and James Cannan, of Utica, N.Y., all experienced lumbermen. After consultation with Mr. Bellew and approval of all interested parties, I was employed as expert for the trip, (being understood trip was to be made in 15 days, and not 28 days) at a fee of \$250 and all expenses paid, and of which I received \$100 on account of said fee on the 12th day of July, 1921.

I left Montreal on the 12th night, via Canadian National Railway and arrived at Halifax on the 13th night, and left the harbor at 4 p.m. the 14th of July on the steamship La Canadienne, for Labrador Coast. I arrived at destination the 25th day of July at Big Brook Bay. The ship anchored in the bay about 3½ miles out from mouth of Big Brook River as the captain after taking soundings would not risk his boat any further in. On the 26th at 7 a.m. we started from ship, N.W. survey, of all the steam launch, one lifeboat and a flat boat, travelled up the river from the mouth for about 2½ miles when on account of no water, although the tide was rising, we were obliged to abandon the launch and anchor her in the stream. We then continued up the river with the lifeboat for about 7 to 8 miles further, this craft drawing about 15in. of water. After using every means possible by pulling, etc., we could not go any further. (Flat boat drawing a few inches of water was taken by Mr. Moynahan and Mr. Haber and the Indian guide who proceeded up the shallow stream to examine the timber, rapids, etc. For further report of their trip see their declaration.)

We landed and proceeded to examine the hills and timber, etc., travelling crosswise and in zigzag lines in separate groups, and on any high spot we could see the depth of the limits and also, could see in rear, a range of hills which seemed to run parallel with the river, very high, and bare rocks, which run directly westwardly as far as we could see. After carefully judging I consider that the timber here is of no commercial value, small scrubby and very branchy down to stone. Any large trees we saw were dead on account of not sufficient nutrition in the poor soil to keep them alive. The average size of trees here is about 7in. in the stock. The river can be easily driven if the timber were there to cut. Logs would have to be put in after the spring freshet and ice had gone by. At the mouth of the river on the north side there is good flat land for buildings, stores, etc., and the river is easily boomed as there is a chain of rocks in the centre of the river, all bare for about half a mile up—at low water and half tide. The tide is not a very heavy one, and only goes up the river for about three miles, and rises only a few feet. If the timber were there it is a lighterage proposition for wood or lumber, and the ships would have to lay off the mouth of river for at least 2½ miles. Rough weather and logs would affect materially, loading and cause great delay and expense.

Operating bush work here would be very objectionable as provisions, horses, etc., could not be brought up by the river only for a mile or two, and a land road would cost many thousands to build, as in any low ground the soil is extra soft, requiring corduroy, and the hills peaky, and heavy slopes towards the river bank. Winter roads could be operated on the ice, which would oblige you to put in all your working plant, horses, etc., over the ice to a central depot up river one season ahead. Considering everything carefully, cost of operation here would be very high and after taking cognizance of the report made by Mr. James and Mr. Arthur, without any prejudice, and without any favor, I condemn the whole proposition. I have no pecuniary interests with any of the parties and give my opinion to the best of my belief and knowledge, from experience gained in the lumber and pulp wood business for the past forty years. The whole most humbly submitted.

WELSH HARD COAL HOTTER THAN U.S.
Less Ash and Much Better Heat, Says Ottawa.

GREAT DIFFERENCE

Six Tons of Welsh Gives Same Heat as Seven Tons U.S. Coal.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.—That the Welsh Anthracite delivered already in Ottawa has a much lower ash content and a much higher heating value than American anthracite received in this country for the past few years, that it is a true anthracite but breaks easier on handling and produces more fines than Pennsylvania anthracite coal, are the summarized results of an analysis of samples of Welsh coal submitted to John McLeish, director of the mines branch of the Dominion Government for testing. The report of the analysis is signed by R. E. Gilmore, chief engineering chemist, and B. F. Haanel, B.Sc., chief of the division of fuels and fuel testing.

An equal quantity of the lump and "fines", or dust, as some Ottawans who have received a delivery of the Welsh anthracite are disposed to call it, were submitted to the director of mines for testing. From the analysis given and from conversation with an official of the testing branch, it is claimed that the fines have excellent heating properties and should be extremely serviceable for the purpose of banking furnaces.

Prom further tests made it is seen that compared with Pennsylvania anthracite such as Ottawans have been used burning the Welsh anthracite has practically 10 per cent. less ash and about 10 per cent. more fixed carbon.

The British thermal unit is the amount of heat required to raise the temperature of a pound of water one degree. Under this test it is found that the calorific value of the Welsh anthracite is given as 14,860 as compared with 12,490 for Pennsylvania anthracite "as received," or 15,200 for Welsh as compared with 13,000 for Pennsylvania when dried at 105 degrees Centigrade.

According to these tests therefore the Welsh anthracite has from 17 to 19 per cent. more heat producing properties than that from Pennsylvania, so that six tons of Welsh anthracite should produce as much heat as seven of the Pennsylvania coal.

The Gallant "Arethusa"

For over a century and a half our navy has never been without an "Arethusa" to show the world how British sailors can fight. That the tradition is well maintained was proved during the recent war when the fifth warship of the name engaged two German cruisers, more powerful than herself, and after a fierce struggle of half-an-hour, put them to ignominious flight, then crowned her day of glory by helping to sink the "Main". The first "Arethusa" had done doughty deeds for France before she was made to change her flag and allegiance on October 20, 1759, and she had to be hotly chased for four hours before she was captured. During the next twenty years the captured "Arethusa" had little opportunity of winning laurels. In 1778, France and England being at war, Keppell's fleet, including the "Arethusa", cruising off the Lizard, sighted two French frigates. One of the latter was quickly overhauled, but the "La Belle Poule" one of the finest ships in the French navy, showed a swift "pair of heels." The little "Arethusa" gave chase and stuck to her with grim tenacity. It was like a fox terrier chasing a mastiff, but at last the "La Belle Poule" was brought to bay, and compelled to fight. Very soon the decks of the "Arethusa" were strewn with dead, but she gave full change, and by perfect seamanship and the deadly precision of her guns, pounded "La Belle Poule" to a condition of wreckage as complete as her own, until all the shot on both ships were expended. Then the "Arethusa", gallant as she was, could do no more, and with difficulty dragged herself back to the British fleet. Although she took no prize with her, that four-hour naval duel won immortality for the name "Arethusa", the proudest borne by any British man-of-war.

The Price of Fish.

IS WHAT COAKER MAKES IT.

Mr. Coaker says that he is now giving \$4 for Labrador fish. Let us analyze this by actual facts and figures. Here is an account supplied to two Labrador fishermen the past spring, dated May 23rd, 1922.

These men have to pay an account of \$440.90, or \$220.45 each. The cash price of these goods if they had had the money to buy would be 20 per cent. less—that is to-day, instead of getting \$4 for their fish on a cash basis they get the price that will be shown in a simple question in proportion. As 100 is to 80, so is \$220.45 to the result. This gives each man a purchasing power out of his summer's catch of \$176.36. If \$220.45 worth of fish gives a price of \$4 per quintal what will \$176.36 give? The answer to this problem is \$3.29, which is exactly what Mr. Coaker is offering to-day for Labrador fish, \$3.29 cents. The price of fish is surely what Coaker makes it.—COM.
