Famous British General Dies in Paris

Nationalist Party in Ireland Growing Stronger—Six Persons Killed in Train Crash—Soldiers' Bonus Bill Passed—'Black Gold' Wins Race by Half Length.

DEATH OF SIR CHARLES TOWNSEND.
PARIS, May 19.—General Sir Charles Townshend, famous as the defender of Kut El Amara, when he was commanding the British forces in Mesopotamia, died here to-day after a six months ill-ness. He was on a visit to his mother-in-law, Countess Caban Dancers, at the time of his illness and death. He was born in 1861, and saw extensive military service in Egypt, India and South Africa.

ANOTHER DEFECTION FROM COS-GRAVE RANKS.
BELFAST, May 19.—"I purpose to leave the Government party, and associate myself with the new Nationalist party in the Dail Eireann," declared John Milroy, Member of the Dail, to his constituents at Cavan to-day. Milroy took an active part in the treaty negotiations, particularly with reference to the boundary negotiations between Ulster and the Free State. I stand where Arthur Griffiths stood and for the principles and policies he advocated. Accordingly I find it impossible to identify myself with what appears the attitude of the Government on national matters, incompatible with that of Griffiths. It bloodshed was averted during the recent trouble in the army, not an iota of thanks was due the Executive Council, Mr. Milroy said. On the boundary question Mr. Milroy said "we are not deluded by the language of Colonial Secretary Thomas, when he spoke of Irishmen settling the matter between themselves. If there is any difficulty to solve, it is a deliberate creation of the British Govern-ment, and we hold it to the undertak-ings given under article twelve of the Anglo-Irish Treaty."

HOUSE IGNORES PRESIDENT'S VETO.
WASHINGTON, May 17.—The House to-day passed the Sol-diers' Bonus Bill over President Cool-idge's veto. Party lines vanished as supporters of the measure piled up a comfortable margin over the two-thirds majority required on such vote. Enactment into law, or final defeat of the Bill, is now up to the Senate where a closer result is expected.

NEW YORK, May 19.—Ma Soo, personal representative

here of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, read a cable on Saturday from Canton, stating that Dr. Sun, who has been variously re-ported as dead and as seriously ill, has recovered and resumed work.

MONTREAL, May 17.—"There is nothing in it, was the comment of the Secretary of Sir Lem-ber Gouin, when shown a despatch say-ing that the former Minister of Jus-tice would resign as member of Par-liament as a protest against the Bud- get.

KEMPTON PARK RACES.
KEMPTON PARK, Eng., May 17.—Parth, by Polymelus out of Wil-tia, owned by A. K. Macomber, at 9 to 2 against, won the Great Jubilee Handicap of \$5,000 run here to-day. Lord Gowans's Verandah, 3 to 1, was second, and Lady Bultough's Solda-cio, 4 to 1, was third. Twelve horses ran.

HORSE RACING NEWS.
LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 18.—The West triumphed over the East for the first time since 1921 in the historic Kentucky Derby, when Black Gold, the favorite, won by a scant length, in a slashing drive to the wire, defeating eighteen of the noblest three year olds in training, before a crowd of eighty thousand persons, the great-est throng that ever witnessed a rac-ing event in the United States.

FATAL TRAIN CRASH.
RALEIGH, N.C., May 18.—Six persons were killed, one prob-ably fatally injured, and five others less seriously hurt, to-day, when a local passenger train crashed into an express train standing in the yards at Apex sixteen miles from here. All were negroes, employees of the road.

ITALIANS RELEASED.
HALIFAX, MAY 18.—Several of the four hundred Italian immigrants who have been held in de-tention here because the authorities believed they had falsely declared themselves as farmers, had been re-leased by Boards of Enquiries, set up here by the Federal Immigration au-thorities, who say that it will take them a full week to examine individ-ually, every case presented in the meantime they have been removed to comfortable quarters.

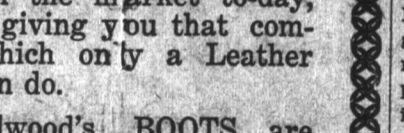
