Although the County of Devon was well and creditably represented in Trinity in the eighteenth century, there is only one man in the old Church Registers who is recorded as having come from Exeter in that ounty, and that man was Thomas Best. The city of Exeter is situate on the river Exe ,that empts into the English Channel at Exmouth. There was no ocean trade-route between Exeter and Newfoundland, and those who came to us from Devon were largely from Torquay, Brixham, evonport and Plymouth; and the najority of those came to us as ungsters who had become attracted us by the coming and going of the shipping between Newfoundland and hose seaport towns of Devon.


