SHANGHAI DEFENDERS

LAUNCH ATTACK. SHANGHAI, Sept. 27. The Chekiang forces of General Lu Hung Hsiang launched an offensive this morning against the Kiang Su armies attempting to take Shanghai. The Chekiang attack was centered on a line between Hwangtu, fifteen miles west of Shanghai, and Kiating. First reports received by Chekiang headquarters from the new offensive asserted gains were being made. There was intimation here to-day that the offensive in which 10,000 Shanghai troops were involved, was the beginning of a general offensive which would involve 30,000 troops.

FRANCE EXPERIENCES BAD WEATHER.

PARIS, Sept. 26. The unprecedented bad weather from which France is suffering shows no sign of change for the better. Instead in some sections it is growing worse, causing damage in regions hitherto unaffected. A fresh violent storm burst over Toulon last night, flooding cellars and stores in the lower part of the city. Lightning struck and damaged the Arsenal, and nearby coast resorts were ravaged.
