An epidemic is likely to occur at any time. The Council viewing the matter in a very serious light thought it would be only fitting to acquaint the Department of Public Health with regard to these matters, and the City Clerk was asked to write Dr. Brehm without further. delay.

Enumerators, reported that this work was now almost completed. He had given very careful consideration to the many defects apparent in the conduct of past Municipal Elections, and strongly recommended certain improvements for this year. The division of the city into six wards was. he thought, impracticable, and as a result some hundreds of voters were disfranchised. He submitted that it would be better to use eleven wards, as in the General Election, and thus avoid the confusion experienced formerly. The Council having thoroughly gone into his report were of opinion that his suggestions were most timely and therefore decided that the wards as agreed upon for last Election be amended, and a new plan of eleven wards, as recommended by the Supervisor, be confirmed. The City Clerk will confer with the Solicitor on the matter, after which a new plan will be drawn up by the City Engineer.
