The Results so Far.
At the present writing all the elections in Ontario, except twelve, have taken place. Of these the Opposition have gained 44, the Ministry 29, and 8 are put down as independent.
The Reformers have gained twenty
counties and have lost three, which
makes a net gain of seventeen. Of

the twelve yet to come off, seven and perhaps eight will be carried by the Reformers, which will swell their strength to over 50 votes in Parliament. In Quebec, too, the results of the elections have far exceeded the most sanguine expectations of the Reformers in Ontario, and shows a gratifying increase in the strength of the Reform element in that Province. The Montreal Herald, an excellent authority on such matters, says that so far in Quebec, there have been elected 31 Ministerialists, 21 Opposition, and 2 Independent. Eleven elections have yet to come off, of which it says seven are for constituencies held by Liberals in the last Parliament, and four by supporters of the Government.

Not only have the Reform victories in Ontario been important in point of numbers, but the Reformers have killed off some of the ablest and most influential supporters of the Government. Sir Francis Hincks, who occupied a position second only to that of the Premier, has sustained a crushing defeat in South Brant, and in despair has given up the attempt of trying to obtain a seat in Ontario. Of the five Ministers who represented Ontario in the last Parliament there were only two who came back to the people for re-election. Messrs. Campbell and Aikins, being Senators, have nothing to do with the popular vote. Mr. Morris vanishes into a judgship on the eve of the election, and Mr. O'Connor, who took his place, appeared before his constituents as an untried Minister, and one who consequently might claim from his friends a fair trial. The only two old members of the Government who appealed to the people of Ontario were the Premier and Sir Francis, and even John Anonly gained his seat by desperate exertions and unscrupulous means. Then McDougall, who has made himself the football of every political party, who though not at the time an actual member of the Government was yet the electioneering ally and tool of Sir John, and who, it was understood, would get a seat in the Cabinet again, if elected.
