WIVES OF GUNMEN SURE OF HUSBANDS' ACQUITTAL

Mrs. Harry Horowitz and Mrs. Louis Rosenberg Confident of Their Mates' Innocence

Mrs. Horowitz Thought Her Husband Was Hard Working Young Man

New York, Sept. 21.—"I know my husband is not guilty of the Rosenthal murder. I am just as sure of that as I am of that I love me, and I am sure of that than anything in the world."

"And I am just as sure as Lillian that Louis can prove his innocence."

With their 18-year-old eyes looking straight and unflinchingly at a newspaper man yesterday, the two young wives of Harry Horowitz, alias "Gyp the Blood," and Louis Rosenberg, alias "Lefty Louie," stoutly maintained their faith in the word of their husbands.

For the first time since their complication in this atrocious crime, these two young women granted their first interview in a very short time.

The two girlish faces are not discolored. On the contrary they were wreathed in smiles and full of spring-like freshness—the last one would pick out as belonging to the wives of men who are held guilty of so bold a crime.

Were Married Last Year. But Harry Horowitz, alias "Gyp the Blood," and Louis Rosenberg, alias "Lefty Louie," were married last year, in May, 1911. Their extraordinary faith in their husbands' innocence is not more remarkable than the statement made by each—seemingly in all good faith—that neither girl ever identified her husband's real name with that of the well-known aliases.

"Why, it wasn't until after the Rosenthal murder—quite a while after—that I saw in the papers that 'Gyp the Blood' had the same name as my husband. I always thought Harry was a hard-working, good, honest fellow who owned a cigar store. He told me when we were married that he made from \$25 to \$35 a week, and we never lived in circumstances that would have led me to doubt it."

"We tried to save, too, for he wanted to have a little home of our own. You know, after we were married, we went to live at my mother's house. But Harry said that as soon as we could afford to we would have our own home."

Asked to tell of her life and how she became the wife of "Gyp the Blood," Mrs. Horowitz said in correction, and slightly indignantly: "I never married 'Gyp the Blood.' I married Harry Horowitz. I never knew he was called by such a name, did I, Lillian?" she asked of her companion.

"I should say not, any more than I knew I had married 'Lefty Louie,'" the other girl added.

LABOR MEN FAVOR A CITY OWNED HOSPITAL

Say It Has Proven a Success in All Eastern Cities Where It Has Been Undertaken

Calgary Trades and Labor Council Endorses Proposal by Resolution

THE proposal to found a municipal hospital in Calgary finds favor with the trades and labor council. At the regular meeting of that body the subject was introduced for discussion by Al. Rose and many cases were instanced where inability on the part of patients to pay for hospital treatment worked serious hardship.

The municipal hospital scheme has proved successful in Winnipeg, Minneapolis and other large centres, and the members of the council formally endorsed the suggestion.

The popularity of the scheme is not confined to laborites and to those interested in the philanthropic aspects of the situation. It is now conceded in many quarters that the hospital accommodation in Calgary will be quite inadequate in a very short time.

It is the opinion of A. Allen, honorary vice-president of the Calgary General Hospital board that another hospital will be required in less than three years. Mr. Allen thinks that this city should put through the bylaw of \$150,000 for the Calgary General Hospital.

These additions will be taxed for accommodation within three years, and the city should meanwhile be working on the municipal project, to take care of the additional cases. Should the citizens grant the money the hospital board will commence excavation of the temporary structures and leasing additional quarters.

Among the cottage schools now in course of construction or about to be completed are the North Calgary, Tuxedo Park, South Calgary, Capitol Hill. The furnishings for the new school buildings are in stock and will be immediately prepared by Secretary A. T. Jewett ready for installation as soon as the buildings are ready.

Will Uniform Cadets

A communication from the office of the minister of education has been received by the local school board notifying it that the principals of the normal and practice schools have been authorized to arrange for uniforming of cadets. The uniforms will be similar to those supplied at other schools of the city. The equipment will be maintained by the Calgary school board.

Deputy Minister of Education MacKenzie has also addressed the local board on the question of the installation of a domestic science department in the normal and practice schools. As soon as the question of accommodation can be disposed of, arrangements will be made for the installation of a plant or for further negotiations opened for co-operation between the local board and the department with a view to introducing this department.

HALF THE BIG CHINESE LOAN OFFERED LONDON

Lloyd's Bank Is Understood to Stand Sponsor for the Loan

London, Sept. 23.—Half of the Chinese loan of \$50,000,000 is to be offered in London for subscription on Thursday or Friday of this week, according to Charles Birch, head of the Anglo-Russian Bank, who has been prominent in the negotiation.

Lloyd's bank is supposed to stand sponsor for the loan.

Capitalists here have hesitated to have an independent group of banks been able to cut the ground from under the feet of the "Six Power" combination representing the United States, Great Britain, France, Germany, Japan, and the Netherlands.

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WILL COMPLETE SCHOOL BUILDINGS BY JAN.

Ramsay and King George Structures Will Accommodate 610 Pupils

Other Buildings, Including Cottages, Progressing Satisfactorily

In both school buildings the workmen are almost ready to run the ceilings, when plastering may be commenced.

Following the completion of these buildings will be added another two-room cottage school, for which the foundation has been laid.

Progress on other buildings has been rapid, and within a few months completion will be entirely relieved.

Large Buildings

It has been announced as the policy of the school department that in future school buildings 18-room school houses will be erected. This is necessary owing to the city's rapid growth, and will obviate the necessity for the erection of temporary structures and leasing additional quarters.
