The first concert of the Calgary Musical Agency's series of ten, will be that of Cecil Fanning, one of the greatest song interpreters in the world, with his most delightful and finished accompaniment, H. over 1,000 articles made for the Red Cross during the month of September. The club is making preliminary arrangements for the annual charity day to be held November 23rd, and the annual Thanksgiving dinner to be given by the domestic science department also that month.

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MUST REPORT OR LOSE CHANCE OF EXEMPTION

All Men Subject to the First
Draft Must Report With-
out Regard to Occu-
pation

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—It has been pointed out that it is necessary for all men who come under the qualifications for the first call of the Military Service act, to report and then claim exemption, if they feel they are justified. It is immaterial what occupation the drafted man may follow, as the tribunals are established for the purpose of deciding on the question of exemption.

The man who deliberately neglects to comply with the act, will forfeit any right to exemption. He will also lose the chance that he has, even if not exempt, of being one of those whose services may not be required because the whole 100,000 men authorized by the law have been provided without his being called upon.

PARLIAMENT MAY BE FORMALLY DISSOLVED TODAY

But Announcement of Elec-
tion for New House Will
Not Be Made For Some
Time Yet

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—There were no important developments in connection with the political situation today. The cabinet council was again in session this afternoon, but apart from a couple of appointments, Sir Robert Borden had no announcement to make.

Opinion is divided in official circles as to whether the dissolution formally announced (Wednesday) or later in the week. An idea has prevailed that it would be necessary for the government to announce the date of the general election at the time of dissolution, but this is not necessary. It has been customary to do so in the past, but, owing to the exceptional circumstances which exist and the practical impossibility of an election taking place within three months, nomination and polling dates are not likely to be decided upon for a few weeks.

The preliminary preparations for the revision of the voters' lists are being proceeded with by the clerk of the crown in chancery, and the general plan for the taking of the vote, both in Canada and overseas, is being worked out.

Rumors as to the possible retirement of Sir Wilfrid Laurier from the Liberal leadership persist in some quarters, but lack confirmation.

ENLISTING RECRUITS FOR FLYING CORPS

Status Will Not Be Altered
by Enforcement of Military Service Act

Victoria, B.C., Oct. 2.—That the status of the Royal Flying Corps, which is a branch of the imperial service, will not be altered by the enforcement of the Military Service act, and that it will be authorized to enlist recruits in Canada for an indefinite period, is indicated by the news that reached here today that the Toronto headquarters will shortly augment the recruiting staffs at present engaged in Pacific coast cities.

MODIFICATIONS IN LICENSES
Washington, Oct. 2.—Modifications were made in the export license system today, so as to remove restrictions on foreign trade and still prevent goods from going to Germany through her allies or the European neutrals.

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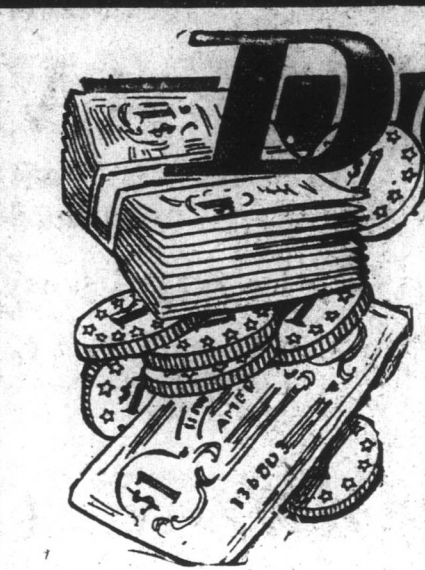

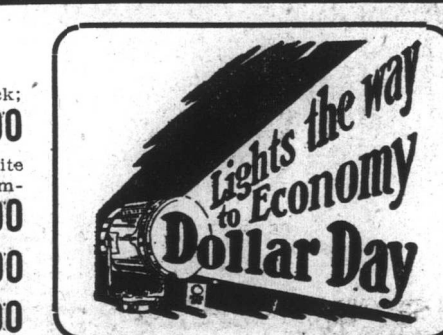

OVERTURES WERE MADE TO FRANCE BY GERMANY

But They Were Indignantly
Rejected by Men Who
Received Them

Petrograd, Oct. 2.—The British, French and Italian governments, through their representatives here, have denied categorically the intention attributed to the German government of making overtures to the Russian government in order to insure their interests. The British ambassador has stated officially that Great Britain would never agree to such a policy.

The French ambassador recently informed the government that a personage occupying an important post in Germany had made overtures to some French politicians with a view to the discussion of questions of interest to France, but that this German attempt was indignantly rejected. The Italian ambassador has informed the government that Italy will continue her co-operation with Russia in the common cause.

PREPARING FOR PEACE

General Hodgins Leaves for London on Important Mission

Ottawa, Oct. 2.—General Hodgins, formerly adjutant-general of the Canadian forces, left Ottawa today on his way to London, England, to take up his duties as a member of the joint committee on demobilization. The committee was formed under the chairmanship of Sir Hugh Allan, to deal with difficulties in the way of a speedy repatriation of the overseas forces, and to formulate plans for demobilization, when peace is declared.

4,000 TURKS CAPTURED
London, Oct. 2.—Nearly 4,000 prisoners were taken by the British army in Mesopotamia, which captured Ramadiah. It is announced officially.

IMPORTANT CONFERENCE

Austrian Foreign Minister to Meet Hungarian Premier

Amsterdam, Oct. 2.—Count Czernin, the Austrian foreign minister, has gone to Budapest, according to Vienna advices, to visit the Hungarian premier. It is expected that Count Czernin, while there, will make an important political speech.

MUST SEVER RELATIONS
Santiago, Chile, Oct. 2.—Peru's seizure of German steamers at Callao and the expulsion of Count von Luxburg, the German minister to Argentina, from Buenos Aires, are again occupying public attention in Chile. It is believed in government circles here that the presence of Count von Luxburg in Chile or in any other South American country, would affect the solidarity of the republic in the western hemisphere.

Guillermo McKenna, in an article in the Mercurio, says that if Chile does not sever diplomatic relations with Germany it would signify the breaking of the bonds which unite Chile with civilized countries.

FIRE IN MUNITIONS FACTORY

London, Oct. 2.—A serious fire and explosion has occurred in a munitions factory in the north of England, according to an official report. Much damage was done to the factory, but thus far there have been no deaths. A number of the workers were injured.

FUTURE OF PATRIOTIC FUND
Toronto, Oct. 2.—At a meeting of the executive of the Canadian patriotic fund in Ottawa on October 3 will be decided the question of whether the society will get its fund next year by a voluntary subscription or by taxes to be levied by provincial or municipal bodies.

ANTI-TREATING LAW
Montreal, Oct. 2.—Fifty-three hotels in Montreal have suddenly awakened to the fact that an anti-treating law has been in force, supposedly for the past four months. The rude awakening came yesterday when Chief Archambault of the provincial revenue police, took legal action against the 53 on charges of violating the anti-treating law passed at the last session of the Quebec legislature.

TAKES OFF COAT ENTIRELY

Guelph, Ont., Oct. 2.—"People tell me I have turned my political coat," declared Hugh Guthrie, M.P., addressing a big meeting of citizens at the Guelph city hall tonight. "I have not turned my political coat; I have taken it off altogether and I intend to keep it off till after the war." Mr. Guthrie concluded his address by reading a statement as to his position. He had not changed his Liberal principles, but believed in the formation of a union and a national government, either before or after the coming general election, and if he was elected such a government was formed, he was prepared to give it his "heart and whole-souled support."

THE NORWEGIAN LOSSES
London, Oct. 2.—The Norwegian legation announced that during September, nineteen Norwegian merchant ships of an aggregate tonnage of 31,000, were lost. Twenty Norwegian seamen were killed, and 17 are reported missing.
