MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

Result of Monday's Voting in Some of the Local Municipalities.

Elections of members of the municipal councils for 1894 were held throughout the province on Monday. In Glencoe Mr. Leitch had been re-elected reeve by acclamation, consequently the usual lively interest was lacking here. There were six candidates for councillors, of whom Fred. Aldred, Jacob Huston, Geo. Lethbridge and Ed. Gale were elected. The village was divided into two polling divisions. Polling for No. 1 division took place at the firemen's hall, where the returning officer, Mr. Geo. M. Harrison, presided, with Mr. T. Roe as poll clerk. The polling for No. 2 division took place at the Thompson hall, with Mr. Geo. Wilson deputy returning officer and Mr. A. Finlayson poll clerk. Following is the result of the voting:—

Will Extend a Unanimous Call to Rev. R. W. Ross, B.A., of Toronto.

A large and representative meeting of the Glencoe Presbyterian congregation was held in the church yesterday for the purpose of moderating in a call to a minister. Rev. Alex. Henderson, of Appin, moderator of the session, presided, and preached an able sermon before the business of selecting a minister was proceeded with. Several names were submitted, but the choice of the congregation fell upon Rev. R. W. Ross, B.A., of Toronto, who occupied the pulpit on Sunday last. Mr. Ross is a young man of vim and ability, and no doubt will prove a worthy successor to the former pastor, Rev. D. Currie, B.D., should he decide to accept the call.

The call to Rev. Mr. Ross is to be in Mr. Young's office for signature till Sunday, when it will be in the vestibule of the church for the same purpose.

Robbed on the Trail.
Our Mosa correspondent writes:—"M. McLeary, while returning home from Dakota, where he was attending his brother, became overtaken and fell asleep on the cars, with the result that he was robbed of \$20 which he had placed for safe-keeping in a pocket in his shirt. That the robbers were professionals there is no doubt, as to avoid awakening or disturbing him they cut out the pocket, contents and all, with some sharp instrument."

A VICTIM OF THE BOTTLE.

A. B. Campbell Dies After Lying in a Ditch All Night.

Early on Friday morning after the men employed in W. W. Gordon's factory had gone to work for the day, a little boy, son of Mr. H. J. Carter, informed them that a man was lying in the ditch near by. Help was summoned and the man, who proved to be A. B. Campbell, a former resident of Mosa, was carried into the house of Mr. Robert Aldred. He was speechless and stiff from cold, and although every effort was made to revive him, he died a few minutes after being taken indoors. The body was taken to Howard & Co's undertaking establishment and afterwards removed to the residence of Hector McLarty from whence the funeral took place on Sunday to Kilmartin cemetery.

Mr. Campbell was an old resident of these parts. He was a native of Long Point, where his father, Captain Campbell, died. His mother afterwards married George Brodie and the family removed to the township of Aldborough. In 1828 they settled on the homestead in Mosa and deceased followed the occupation of a sailor for some 8 years, after which he followed farming in Mosa and Ekfrid townships, acquiring considerable property. He never married and at the time of his death was in fair circumstances, owning a farm in Ekfrid and another in Mosa. A sister resides in Detroit and another in Strathroy. He leaves, besides, several step-sisters and step-brothers.

Mr. Campbell was always known as an honest, kind and intelligent person and had many friends who will regret his untimely end. Unfortunately, he had one great fault—a fondness for liquor. To the latter his death is no doubt due, as he was seen at a late hour the night before in an intoxicated condition. His age was 71 years.
