TORONTO, Nov. 24—11 p.m.—To-night there is  
a small depression moving east to the north-  
ward of the lakes, and another of more import-  
ance off the coast of Nova Scotia. The pressure  
is highest over the Western and Southern  
States. Light snow has fallen in parts of the  
Maritime Provinces, but generally in the Du-  
mion the weather has been fine. Strong  
southwest winds prevail on the lakes. Min-  
imum and maximum temperatures: Prince  
Albert, 16—22; Edmonton, 26—46; St. Appelle,  
26—46; Winnipeg, 19—46; Port Arthur, 15—  
25; Toronto, 16—25; Montreal, 10—27; Quebec,  
8—46; Halifax, 20—32.
