Toronto, Oct. 12—11 a.m.—The low area which was over the Northwest States yesterday during the night developed into a severe storm, which has passed northward across Manitoba, giving a very heavy gale with rain in the Province. The high pressure continues over the lakes and has extended to the Maritime Provinces. The weather has been fair to cloudy in Ontario and fine in the Provinces east. An east to south gale has prevailed on Lake Superior.

Seventh Battalion R.A.
The annual meeting of the Seventh Battalion R.A. Association took place in the hall room at the drill shed last evening, quite a number, about 70, being present, Col. Payne in the chair. The

minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. The secretary and treasurer's reports, which were read and passed, showed the association to be free from debt and having the Government grant to the good year are: President, Col. Payne; vice-president, Lieut. Howie; secretary, W. E. Hiscott, bandmaster; treasurer, Capt. Geo. Hayes. Arrangements were made for annual matches to be played on Thanksgiving day at the Cove Ranges. The following comprise the executive committee: Col. Payne, Capt. Moore, Lieut. Graham, the treasurer, secretary, Col. Serjt. Brown, land, No. 1, Corp. Rose, No. 2, Serjt. Jacobs, No. 3, Serjt. Heaman, No. 4, Serjt. Jacobs, No. 5, and Serjt. Major McCrimmon. Committees were appointed to wait on citizens and others willing to assist with the prize list. Suggestions were made to have company skirmishing and volley firing, team matches, which will be carried out. A considerable number of other points were discussed and the meeting was adjourned just before 10 o'clock, after which the executive met and started at work for the match, which they expect will be a good one.

Settled at Last.
The New Street Railway Company's Proposition Accepted.

The Council Will Offer the Option to the Old Company.

A Prolonged Session of the City Fathers With Definite Results in Terms of the Agreement.

The hour hand on the clock was midway between 12 and 1 and the electric light had long before flickered away when the city fathers rose from their deliberations this morning and wended their several ways homeward. They had done a good night's work, for they succeeded at last in making some definite disposal of that civic bugbear—the electric street railway proposition.

Messrs. Hellmuth and Ivey, solicitors for the new company, appeared with printed copies of their proposition as it had been jointly revised and amended by the city solicitor and themselves. Each clause was gone over and it was substantially adopted by the council though not without a good deal of discussion, explanation and demurring. The amended proposition differs but little from the original, save of course that in the former are not included those portions of Dundas and Rector streets to which the right of the old company has been recently established by the courts.

The construction is to be commenced 60 days after the agreement is signed and seven miles are to be built within one year. The proposition agrees to pay every year during the term covered by this agreement (except the first two years during which time the road is being built) to the corporation the sum of \$100 per annum per mile of single track and \$200 per annum per mile of double track, provided always that the gross receipts of the proposed amount to \$60,000 per year. If not they will not be liable for this mileage rate. The company also agree to pay the city the following percentage on all gross receipts:

Under \$100,000 5 per cent.
Between 100,000 and 125,000 5 1/2 per cent.
Between 125,000 and 150,000 6 per cent.
Between 150,000 and 175,000 6 1/2 per cent.
Between 175,000 and 200,000 7 per cent.
Over 200,000 8 per cent.

The sum of \$5,000 to be deposited by the company as a guarantee of good faith.

The committee of the whole then rose and reported.

Ald. Moule who had been chairman moved the adoption of the agreement as amended in committee. Other it was made without reference to the earnings of the company. Lost.

Ald. Parnell moved that sub-section A of clause 18 be amended to provide that cars stop only at crossings and then on the far side. Carried.

Ald. Parnell moved that employees be not required to work more than ten hours a day, statutory and other holidays excepted. Lost on a division of 10 to 4.

Ald. John Heaman, Jones, Bartlett and Parnell voted yes; Ald. Connor, Yates, Jeffery, O'Meara, Moule, Gartshore, Wm. Hesman, Hannah, Garratt, Draney, Fitzgerald, Shaw and Judd were the nays.

Ald. Judd moved to strike out those portions of clauses 4 and 10 in which it states that the corporation furnish the materials to fix the streets. Lost.

Ald. Judd moved again that clause 25 be amended to allow the corporation to negotiate with the old street railway company to use electricity as a motor power. This was vigorously objected to by Ald. O'Meara, who pointed out that its effect would be to kill everything that had done.

Mr. Ivey—If the exclusive right is not granted we are out.

The amendment was lost—13 to 3.

The adoption of the report was moved and carried.

Ald. Gartshore moved that the proposal of Chas. H. Ivey and others, as approved by the council, be submitted to the London Street Railway for the exercise of its option. Carried.

The London Street Railway has 30 days in which to decide whether it will accept the council's proposition or not.
