Fires, Fighting And Friction

Following in the Wake of the Relief of Pekin.

Russian Commander Adopts a Go-as-You-Please Policy-Reiterated Reports That the Empress Has Been Captured by Japs-Russian Success in Manchuria-No More

London, Friday, Aug. 24-3:30 a.m.-Fires, fighting and dissension are apparently following in the wake of the relief of Pekin. The Daily Mail publishes dispatches from the Chinese capital, dated as late as Aug. 7, declaring that a great fire was then raging in the imperial city.

The Russian commander had declined to accept the decision of the other generals not to violate the imperial precincts, and street fighting was going on. General Chaffee, so it is asserted, maintained that the Chinese had been adequately punished already, and that it would be unwise to take the

imperial palace. This explains the withdrawal of the Americans after breaching three gates, as cabled by the special correspondent of the Associated Press. The Russian general, however, maintained that his government had declared war against China, and that, therefore, there was no reason to prevent him carrying hostilities into the sacred precincts.

United States Troops for China.

Tuan have been captured. The emperor

is said to be in Pekin with the allied forces. London, Aug. 24 .- Among the puzzling reports as to the whereabouts of the empress dowager is one from St. Petensburg that she is in the vicinity of Pekin, but surrounded. The emperor seems to have completely disappeared. According to telegrams from Shanghai, considerable uneasiness is felt there over the fact that no dispatches have been received from Pekin since Aug. 20. Other Shanghai reports locate Emperor Kwang Su as under the protection of the allies and the dowager empress as already captured by

the Japanese. SOMEWHAT AT SEA.

All the dispatches point to the fact that when the latest message left Pekin the commanders were somewhat at sea regarding their future action, all awaiting instructions from their governments. The foreign residents appear to have been sent to Tien Tsin. although the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail says the ministers will not leave Pekin until negotiations for indemnity are under way. Neither the commander nor the diplomats were in communication with the Chinese Government on Aug. 17. They were then searching for Prince

IN MANCHURIA. St. Petersburg dispatches announce good progress in the Manchurian cam-The town of Mergen was captured Aug. 18, with trifling Russian loss, while the Chinese suffered severely, leaving ten guns, 700 rifles and large quantities of ammunition in the

hands of the Russians. NORTHERN COREA. The reports of the risings in Northern Corea are confirmed. It is believed that these are not due to ill-will toward foreigners, but to local dissatisfaction. The Corean Government is

sending troops to the disaffected dis-

A WARNING. A special dispatch from Tien Tsin says that Mr. Wm. Pethwick, formerly of Brooklyn, N. Y., for many years Earl Li's secretary and confidential adviser of the Chinese Government, wired the United States consul at Tien Tsin, under date of Pekin, Aug. 10, as follows: "Li Hung Chang should be ignored. He represents the hostile ministry, and will avert the just punishment by misrepresenting our position if he can."

Important Decision.

NO MORE U. S. TROOPS.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 23.-The important development in the Chinese situation today was the decision of the government not to send any more troops to China. All the troops now at sea, amounting to about 4,000, together with those under orders for service in the far East, which have not sailed, amounting to about 3,000 more, will be sent to Manila, unless there are developments in China, not now expected, which would make their presence in that country necessary. Secretary Root said today that no more troops were being sent to China because they were not needed. With the arrival at Taku of the Hancock and the troops she carried Gen Chaffee will have 5,000 available men, which is deemed sufficient for all present pur-

poses. Chaffee today, dated Pekin, Aug. 18. Gen. Chaffee did not report further fighting in Pekin, and for that reason the Washington officials feel assured that hostile demonstrations in the Chinese capital have ceased. Gen. Chaffee reported that the telegraph line which was constructed by the signal corps from Tien Tsin to Pekin is frequently interrupted, being cut, probably by hostile Chinese.

CO-OPERATION OF THE ALLIES. Washington, D. C., Aug. 23.-The navy department has made public the report of Capt. B. H. McCalla, who was in command of the American contingent of the international column under Admiral Seymour, that on June 10 he made the first move in the relief of Pekin, but which was cut off by the Chinese troops on the road and forced to turn back from Yang Tsun. The force was made up of British, Russian, German, Austrian, Italian, Japanese, French and American marines and bluejackets. Its aggregate strength was 2,078 officers and men. These forces were all acting with nominal independence, but were tacitly under the command of Admiral Seymour, and operated as one body. It is interesting to note Capt. Mc-Calla's description of how the various commands co-operated; how the British and Russians in turn helped to shift the Newark's 3-inch rifle from one position to another when the American gun crew was inadequate to transport it; how the Americans led the advance up the railway and protected the rear in the retreat, and how, during the re-peated attacks of the Chinese on the Tien Tsin arsenal, British, Russian and Americans in turn would apring into possible to the state of the state

McCalla has nothing but the warmest praise both for Admiral Seymour and all of the other officers who participated in the expedition. RETURNED MISSIONARIES.

Toronto, Aug. 23 .- Dr. and Mrs. Leslie, of the Presbyterian mission in China, arrived in the city this morning from the Orient, and will go on to Montreal tonight to visit Mrs. Leslie's father, Mr. Ogilvie. Dr. Leslie, who was very badly wounded during the attack on the Canadian mission-

aries, is recovering slowly from the fifwounds sustained in various teen parts of the body from the knives of the Boxers. Dr. Perry Leslie repeats the statement, several times hinted at in cables from China, that friction among the Protestant and Catholic missionaries was responsible for a part of the trou-ble in China. When asked what he considered to be the most direct reason of the present trouble, Dr. Leslie sad the important one was the anti-foreign prejudice which had been handed down from generation to genera-tion. This prejudice, moreover, was

PART TAKEN BY THE BRITISH. London, Aug. 23.-General Gaselee, the commander of the British forces at Pekin, has telegraphed to the war

office as follows: "Pekin, Aug. 15, Wednesday-vla Che Foo, Aug. 21, Tuesday.-At a conference. Aug. 12, it was agreed that the allies should concentrate within five miles of Pekin, Aug. 14, and the assault should begin Aug. 15. The attack, however, commenced early in the morning of Aug. 14, and our troops had to make a forced march of 15 miles, from Tung Chow, in great heat. We were on the extreme left, and attacked the southeast gate of the Chinese city. There was practically no opposition, as we were not expected at that point. The Indian troops broke down and rushed the gate, and I entered with cavalry and guns. I then sent other cavalry and the Punjab infantry to the Temple of Heaven to secure our left flank and camping ground, and with the other corps pushed on towards the

legation. "At 3 o'clock we got on the canal, opposite the water-gate, and were signaled from the wall held by the legationers. I, with a portion of the staff and seventy Indians, rushed across the almost dry moat, and entered through the water-gate, without loss. We found all well in the legations. Mac-Donald immediately showed me around the positions with the view of

further action. "In the meantime our field artillery had been brought up to bombard the central gate of the Tartar city; but a sortie by the Americans and Russians of the garrison along the wall anticipated the bombardment, and the gate fell into our hands. Two field guns were then brought into the legation and the rest were sent back to the Temple of Heaven. At about 5 in the afternoon the Americans, under Gen. Chaffee, entered the legation, and then we moved on towards the central gate of the Tartar city for the night.

"By nightfall we had four hundred men in the legation. [Here, apparently, some words are missing.] "During the evening, at the Temple of Heaven, we were engaged, and after inflicting heavy losses, we occupied the south gate of the Chinese city.'

AMERICANS IN IT.

Pekin, Aug. 15-Via Che Foo, Aug. 22. The Americans breached three gates before the imperial palace and occupied the approaches to the last wall. Capt. Henry Reilly, Battery F, Fifth United States Artillery, and five privates were killed and sixteen wounded. During the afternoon the Americans returned to the camp, pending a conference between the generals. Thereupon the Russians occupied the approaches to the palace. was standing on the wall and direct-
