## HOWLING GALE ON THE

Steamer Bannockburn Pounding to Pieces.

UPPER LAKES

Half a Dozen Schooners Blown Ashore or Foundered—Fruit Growers Also

Lose Heavily. Chicago, Sept. 17.-The cool northwest wind, which for several days has swept over the lakes, assumed during the past twenty-four hours the proportions of a gale, and much damage was done to shipping. The southern end of Lake Michigan escaped comparatively unharmed, but in the upper lakes, where the boats had gone out despite the storm signals sent out by the government weather bureau, many wrecks and mishaps occurred. The wrecks reported are:

Cleveland, Ohio, Sept.17.-The schooner J. J. Barnum weathered the storm, and reached port today under sail. MANY WRECKS.

Schooer J. Ellen, water-logged and abandoned in mid-lake opposite Milwaukee; crew of four rescued after rreat hardships. Two-masted schooner, name un-known, foundered near Lake Linden, Mich.; crew believed to have been

rescued.

Steamer Bannockburn, ashore and pounding to pieces near Harbor Beach, Mich.; crew in great danger. Three-masted schooner, name unknown, ashore in a dangerous position Schooner J. J. Barnum, abandoned by her consort in mid-lake, off Cleveand, and believed to have foundered.

Schooner Jupiter, water-logged in Saginaw Bay. St. Joseph.—The heavy gales along the Lake Michigan shore are doing thousands of dollars' damage to the apple crop. It is estimated that 40,000 bushels of apples have been blown from the trees within the past 24 hours.
