Ottawa, July 7.—The special committee on Mr. Charlton's bill concerning impurities in elections, and to inquire into the whole standing of the laws, met yesterday morning. Mr. Charlton being appointed chairman. It was decided that each member be supplied with copies of the existing laws. THE GATHERED WARSHIPS

House of Commons Questioned About Far East.

London, July 7.—Replying to a question in the House of Commons on the number of British, American and Japanese warships in the Gulf of Pechili, and the object of the gathering of the Russian and other fleets there, Arnold-Forster said there were twelve British ships in this waters, but the admiralty was not aware that any special gathering of warships had occurred or that there was any special object aimed at by the powers responsible for the movements of the vessels in Chinese waters.

BELLIGERENT BULGARIA

Is Unwilling to Accept Warning of the Powers.

Vienna, July 7.—According to the Austrian Foreign Office semi-official reports received here indicate that the situation between Bulgaria and Turkey has become more serious. Bulgaria appears unwilling to consider the admonitions of the great powers to maintain peace, notwithstanding the note sent to Sofia, July 4, in which Bulgaria was warned that Austria and Russia were absolutely in accord, and that the Bulgarian complaints against Turkey were considered to be much exaggerated.

Berlin, July 7.—A Sofia dispatch to the Lokal Anzeiger says the Bulgarian War Office had called out 20,000 reserves, ostensibly for three weeks' maneuvers, and that two battalions of pioneers. The Frankfort Zeitung states that the Turkish Government has decided to immediately order 106 quick-firing guns from the Krupp works.

THE PUBLIC WILL PAY

The Coal Trust Sends Up the Price to \$6.75.

Philadelphia, July 7.—The price of coal went up 10 cents a ton yesterday, in accordance with the circulars sent out by the Reading Coal and Iron Company. On August 1 another increase will be added, and a further advance of the same amount will be made in September.

By Oct. 1 the price will be back to the basis which prevailed after the strike, \$6.75, to local customers by retail dealers. This means that the so-called "Coal Trust" will retain indefinitely the 50 cents a ton which was added to the coal price after the strike was ended. The former retail price of coal in Philadelphia was \$6.25 a ton in full and winter months. It is now fixed at \$6.75, and it is predicted that it will be years before the price is reduced. A retail dealer said yesterday:

"I see the Reading and other companies have already recouped their losses by the coal strike, so their reports say. The price of coal will stay up as high as ever, and the public will pay the strike bill several times over."

THE TREADGOLD CONCESSION

Supplies to the Amount of \$4,000,000 Voted for the Postoffice Department.

Ottawa, July 6.—In the House of Commons today Mr. Sutherland, of North Essex, desired to amend the bill respecting the Central Life Insurance Company, by allowing the company to begin business as soon as it had received the necessary capital, instead of requiring 25 per cent.

Mr. Fielding said this amendment was somewhat more sweeping than he had been led to suppose, and at his suggestion it was laid over to give him time to consider it.

Mr. Fielding, answering Mr. Taylor, said there was no record of Sir John Hood having received pay from the Dominion treasury for services outside his regular salary as judge, except that he was employed by the Province of Ontario as arbitrator in the settlement of accounts between the provinces and the Dominion. The Government of Canada made a contribution to the common fund for the expenses of this arbitration, but he could not say what amount Sir John Hood received.

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
