**VERDICT FOR \$3,800 WAS GIVEN
AGAINST G. T. R. IN PHIBBS CASE**

The jury at Winter Assizes Award-
ed Widow of Engineer the
Maximum Allowed.

The jury in the case of Phibbs vs.
the G. T. R. awarded the plaintiff dam-
ages to the extent of \$3,800 yesterday
afternoon, after having remained out
about an hour and a half.

Mr. A. R. Aylesworth, in his address
to the jury, pointed out the fact that
it was practically proven that the en-
gineer of No. 7 had disregarded the
semaphores set against him, but con-
sidered that the Phibbs was guilty of
contributory negligence since he
had been working in the yards un-
der the protection of the semaphores.
He contended, too, that the yard-
master had blundered in the first
place in ordering the coupled engines
in the main track.

The judge, in charging the jury, re-
minded them that they were limited
by law to awarding the plaintiff only
three years' wages, or \$3,800. The
court was, if anything, favorable to
plaintiff's case.

The jury thus awarded the full
amount to plaintiff. The jury, in find-
ing that Phibbs was not guilty of any
contributory negligence, pointed out
that the coupled engines were never
out of danger while they had been on
the main line in the first place, and
that they could have been safe if the
orders of the yardmaster and signal-
man had not been confused.

The case of Hamilton vs. L. E. and
D. R. R. has been postponed until the
next assizes, as to how far the G. T.
R. Insurance Society for its em-
ployees relieves the company of the
