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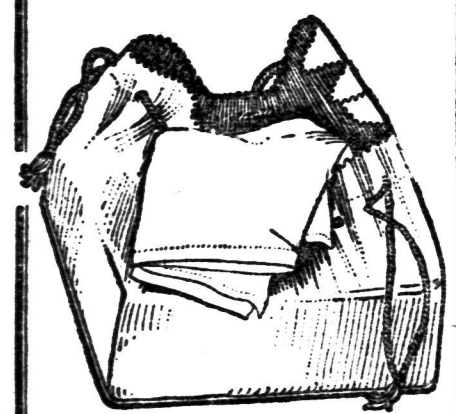

A WARM BATTLE FOR PRIVILEGES

Springbank Park Appears to Be in Demand and Street Railway Have Opposition.

FARES TO BE REDUCED

Ten Cents for Round Trip, With, Perhaps, Stopover Privileges—Matter Before Water Commissioners.

At a special meeting of the water commissioners held yesterday afternoon, city capitalists who were represented by Messrs. W. C. Fitzgerald and A. H. Gibbons, of this city, offered to instal \$10,000 worth of amusement devices at Springbank Park before May 24, if given the sole privilege.

At the same time an agreement with the London street railway for amusement devices at the park, and the rate of fare were discussed.

No action was taken in either, and a special meeting will be held on Monday next to further consider the offers.

Mr. King's Proposition.

Manager King submitted his proposed agreement. It was that the park be leased to the company for seven years, with a three-year option at the expiration of that time, the theatre was to be continued on the same terms as heretofore, and that the company be allowed the privilege from time to time of erecting amusement devices, subject to the approval of the commissioners. He also offered the right to remove them at any time, and of sub-letting them, provided the park was left in as good condition as before the ten years.

The Fitzgerald Offer.

Chairman Jones then asked Mr. Fitzgerald what his proposition was. "We are ready to spend \$10,000 in amusement devices for the park," said Mr. Fitzgerald. "We desire to popularize the city and keep the people at home rather than allow them to go to other cities and spend their money. We wish to commence work as soon as possible, so that we can be ready by May 24."

"The company have had the privilege of installing amusement devices for years, and they never have done it," said Mr. Gibbons. "We want to do that. We will popularize the park, and I am certain will help the company's business greatly."

"Will you give a bond to that effect?" asked Chairman Jones.

"Yes, we are willing to put up a bond of \$1,000 at once," said Mr. Fitzgerald.

Ticket Each Way.

The question of fares was reverted to again and Mayor Stevely pointed out that a large number of people were of the opinion that a green ticket should be the fare for each way.

"No, we cannot do that," said Manager King.

"It's absurd," said Chairman Jones. "It cannot be done."

"It should be considered," said Mayor Stevely. "It does not look reasonable, however."

"Commissioner Darch wanted stopover privileges. He asked if stopover privileges could not be given at Woodland Cemetery."

"The principle is a ride a fare, and we cannot go back on that," said Mr. King.

"We are besieged with complaints," answered Chairman Jones.

"They are not valid complaints," reported Manager King.

"What about the pump-house?" continued Commissioner Darch.

"We cannot make any difference there," said Mr. King. "We do not know where it would end if we started."

"We have figured out that a reduction of the fare will mean a saving to the citizens of \$2,000 a year," said Chairman Jones. "What can you offer against that?"

"Nothing as yet," responded Mr. Fitzgerald.

"We might later, but I don't know. We are trying to popularize the park, which is something in itself."

Would Buy Power.

Mr. Gibbons pointed out that the city had contracted for more power than it could use, and that they were willing to take a considerable amount of power.

"If an industry employing as many as 100 men were to come to London, you would be willing to offer inducements," added Mr. Gibbons.

"Commissioner Darch would mean more to the city than the reduction in fares could be made by the Amusement Company."

Ten-Cent Fares.

"We want ten-cent fares," said Mr. Darch. "The company have agreed to that. What offer can you make that will lead us to make a choice in your favor?"

A Guarantee.

The matter of amusement privileges was brought up by Mr. Jones, who wanted to know if the company would guarantee to put in the privileges if the lease were given them.

"We will not guarantee anything," said Mr. King. "However, we do not avail ourselves of this privilege within a certain time, say 60 days, you could award them to others."

"Thirty days is plenty long enough," answered Mr. Jones. "Put it in the agreement that if the company do not avail themselves of the privileges of putting in certain devices, they can be offered to others."

Mr. King suggested that the 10-cent fare be commenced April 1.

"We cannot make an agreement to take effect next year," said Mr. Jones.

Eight-Year Agreement.

"Give us a few days to get tickets made," said Mr. King. "We will commence this year. Make the agreement eight years instead of seven."

Mr. Fitzgerald offered to increase the bond from \$1,000 to \$1,500 if the commissioners so desired.

A long discussion took place over the stopover privileges at the pumping station.

Commissioner Darch tried to get Mr. King to consent to it, but the latter was obstinate. He promised to give a definite answer in a few days, and the board adjourned.

SPINELLI MUST DIE

Court Refuses a Stated Case To Murderer of Chinaman.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 22. — The court of appeal this morning refused to grant an order for a stated case for Sam Spinelli, the young Italian under sentence to be hanged at North Bay for the murder of a Chinaman at Haileybury. The cabinet had previously refused to interfere in the case, and Mr. Justice Riddell, the trial judge, also had refused to grant a stated case, hence the application to the court of appeal, which in a verbal decision announced this morning took the ground there was no stated case in its opinion.

CIGAR SOLD ON SUNDAY

A DRUG, SAYS COURT

Unless It Is Bought for Pleasure and Then It's a Cigar.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 22. — In deciding this morning that a cigar is a drug unless the prosecution establishes that it was sold only for pleasure, Judge Morson, junior county judge, here, has rendered a decision that will delight smokers, who have heretofore found it difficult to get tobacco on Sunday.

Judge Morson had before him by way of appeal the case of a druggist, W. H. Lee, fined \$5 by Magistrate Kingsford, some time since for a breach of the Lord's Day act, by selling a cigar from his shop on Sunday. Lee appealed to the junior county judge, who also decided in Lee's favor, that ice cream was a food, and might be sold on the Sabbath. Mr. Lee put on the stand Prof. Hebbner, Mr. Dwyer and Prof. Graham Chambers, all of whom testified that they were in the habit of prescribing cigars and tobacco to be smoked as a relief for constipation and other troubles. On the evidence Judge Morson said: "A cigar is clearly a drug. It is perfectly clear on this evidence that the sale of a cigar is a breach of the statute taking no note of intention. It must be sold as a drug on Sunday only, however, for some known ill. If sold simply to smoke for pleasure, it constitutes a breach of the Lord's Day act."

THE PERMANENT FORCES

Ninety-One Members for the Establishment in London.

Ottawa, Nov. 23. — The militia department announced this morning that the permanent force has been fixed for the permanent force: Halifax 12,297, Fredericton 34, Quebec 281, St. John (Que.) 99, Ottawa 66, Kingston 338, Toronto 257, London 31, Winnipeg 196 and Esquimaux 131.

BROKE DENTAL ACT

Head of a Toronto Concern Fined by Magistrate.

Toronto, Nov. 23. — James Henry, proprietor of the Toronto police court, was fined \$20 or 20 days in jail by Magistrate Kingsford in the police court yesterday afternoon on a charge of breach of the dental act.

Mr. Henry is not a duly qualified dentist, but he stated that he employed two regular dental practitioners, both graduates of the Royal College of Dental Surgeons. These two men, according to Mr. Henry, are paid regular salaries, while he buys the supplies and takes the profits. He equipped the office and looks after the advertising.

Mr. Gideon Grant, counsel for Mr. Henry, argued that as Mr. Henry was not practicing the profession of dentistry, he was not breaking the law.

"I am satisfied that there should be a conviction," said his worship.

"Then we'll appeal," said Mr. Grant. The Dental College has tried to put Mr. Henry out of business by a civil suit, which has been in progress for three years, but has not succeeded, and now is trying this way.

It was suggested to Mr. Odell that Mr. Roosevelt on his return to this country in April was to make an effort to succeed Mr. Dewey as United States senator. In fact Mr. Roosevelt in personal conversation, has frequently stated that he wanted to go to the United States Senate.

"That may be all right," replied Mr. Odell, "but my information is to the contrary, and that Roosevelt will be nominated for governor."

ROOSEVELT BAGS A SINGING TOP!

Gets Four More Elephants, Oribi, Bohor and Kob—Party All Well.

Nairobi, British East Africa, Nov. 23.—Reports received today from the American hunting expedition are to the effect that all the members of the party are well and will return to London Nov. 30.

During the hunting on the Guas Inghisi plateau, Roosevelt and Kermit Roosevelt, in company with the African explorer, Carl E. Akeley, killed four elephants for the American Museum of Natural History at New York. Roosevelt has decided to give one of the elephants killed earlier to the museum of the University of California.

The party took many other trophies, including five horned giraffes, a leopard, a roan bushback, a Jackson's hartbeest, an oribi, a singing topi, a bohor and a kob.

THE PURITAN SAFE

Is Riding at Anchor Outside the Harbor of St. Joseph.

St. Joseph, Mich., Nov. 23. — The passenger steamer Puritan, of the Graham & Morton Line, with her rudder torn away and tugs ordered to her relief, is riding at anchor on Lake Michigan off New Buffalo, Mich., after a day of strenuous but fruitless efforts to make the harbor of St. Joseph.

A gale of 25 miles an hour is blowing on the lake, but officers of the line express no anxiety about the safety of the vessel and her 15 passengers.

SUBSIDIZED LINE NEEDED

Ottawa, Nov. 23.—Canada's commercial agent at Melbourne, Mr. D. H. Ross, reports to the department of trade and commerce that on Jan. 1 next heavy freights between Canada, the United States and Australia pass under the control of the American shipping ring, and that merchants are a good deal exercised over the prospect of increased freight rates and consequent interference with business.

They are hoping for a subsidized Australian-Canadian line to provide regular competition. It will be remembered that a delegation of businessmen recently asked the establishment of a service between Montreal, St. John and Australian ports. The matter is under consideration.

A NARROW ESCAPE

St. Thomas, Nov. 23.—Edward Forman, hostler in the Pere Marquette yards, had a narrow escape tonight.

In attempting to jump on the pilot while the engine was moving he slipped and his leg was caught between the driving wheels and the rails. In falling he threw himself so as to clear the track, but the drivers struck the muscles, tearing them off and fracturing the limb between the knee and the ankle.

The ambulance was called and took him to the hospital, where the company's surgeon, Dr. Guest, attended the young man's injury. The doctor will probably save the leg. Mr. Forman boards on Locust street.

TENDERS WERE OPENED

Will Be Tabulated

Niagara Power Committee Held

Meeting—City Has Right to Put Poles Where Placed.

Tenders for the equipment of the transformer station and the underground work for Niagara power were opened at a meeting of the special power committee held last evening, but they were not disposed of. Ald. Stewart, Secretary Baker and Engineer Sifton will tabulate them, and submit the figures at a meeting to be held next week.

Tenders for 450 35-foot poles were opened, and on motion of Ald. Beattie were awarded to the Bissell Company, of Toledo, for \$5 15 per pole. This was the lowest tender.

A Uniform System.

The report of City Auditor Jewell regarding the work of the accountants present at the meeting in Toronto for the preparation of a uniform system of accountancy was presented. In it he pointed out that the commission had not power to pay the expenses of the accountants, but each municipality must pay its proportionate share. He desired instructions on the matter.

"It is absolutely necessary that a uniform system be adopted," said Mayor Stevely. "The commission is seized of that fact, and it is because of this fact that the auditors have met. Mr. Jewell should be paid, as it is entirely out of his line of work. There are other expenses in connection with this, of which we will have to bear our share."

It was decided to recommend to the council that Mr. Jewell be paid, and that the city bear its share of the other expenses, and also that he be sent to Toronto for the next meeting of auditors.

Just Nicely Started.

When this matter came up in council Ald. Cooper wanted to know when the expense of this power business was going to end.

"You have just got nicely started," answered Ald. Stewart. "However the recommendation of the committee carried."

Ald. Beattie asked the chairman if the opinion of City Solicitor Meredith had been obtained upon the location of the city's poles and those of the London Electric.

"He told me that we were well within our right," said Ald. Stewart, "so long as we caused no inconvenience or damage to the London Electric. Several of their poles had to come down in any event."

"We had better have that opinion in writing," said Ald. Beattie. "There is a lot of discussion about this matter, and we had better know where we stand. Some claim we will cause them inconvenience and damage."

Mayor Stevely reported that the difficulty over the customers' duties on the Locke insulators would soon be settled with no cost to the city.

Those present were Ald. Stewart, chairman, Ald. Parsons, Ald. Moorehead, Ald. Fitzgerald, Ald. Beattie, Mayor Stevely, Engineer Sifton and Secretary Baker.
