Manager Beard quoted a price \$20 for two kinds of phones—one an unlimited local phone, and a twoparty long distance attachment. Ald. Morgan wanted the \$15 rate for

Blake transmitters and accused Manager Beard of forcing upon customer the higher-priced telephones. He thought that the Blake transmitter was good enough, and that the people should be given the benefit of it. Mr. Beard's Explanation.

"We do not practice deception at all," said Manager Beard. "We generally quote the \$20 price, as we think it the better value and more suitable. We are installing the Blake phone all the time. We take orders for them right along, and when a customer wants one, we give it to him." After some discussion it was decid-
