

**FLURRY OVER TELEPHONES!
MANAGER BEARD EXPLAINS**

**States That the Bell Company
Take Orders for Blake
Phones.**

The only flurry at the meeting of the board of works last night was occasioned when Ald. Morgan and Manager Beard of the Bell Telephone Company locked horns over the installation of four telephones in the residences of the ward foremen.

Manager Beard quoted a price of \$20 for two kinds of phones—one an unlimited local phone, and a two-party long distance attachment.

Ald. Morgan wanted the \$15 rate for Blake transmitters and accused Manager Beard of forcing upon customers the higher-priced telephones. He thought that the Blake transmitter was good enough, and that the people should be given the benefit of it.

Mr. Beard's explanation, "We do not practice deception at all," said Manager Beard. "We generally quote the \$20 price, as we think it the better value, and more suitable. We are installing the Blake phone all the time. We take orders for them right along, and when a customer wants one, we give it to him."

After some discussion it was decided to place a Blake phone in each of the foremen's homes.

Ald. Tancock reported that he had inspected the Scanlon drain, of which W. McFadden complained, but found it impossible to do anything to assist him out of the trouble.

Underground Wires.
Manager Beard appeared before the committee and asked to be given permission to place phone wires underground on Dundas and Richmond streets. He pointed out that the company was doing a great deal of this work, as it had proved satisfactory.

Ald. Tancock asked Mr. Beard if the company would consent to place the fire alarm wires in a duct with their wires. Mr. Beard answered that the company was perfectly willing, but that the city would have to pay a rental.

Mr. A. M. Hamilton was instructed to purchase bulbs and plants for the parks at a cost not to exceed \$125.

Those present were Ald. Tancock (chairman), Ald. Saunders, Ald. Pocock, Ald. Morgan, Mayor Beattie, Assistant Engineer Wright and Secretary Baker.

**New Bread Bylaw Will Make

The proposal is to give him a clerk to do clerical work for the department. At the present time, a great portion of Inspector McCallum's efforts are taken up in doing the mechanical clerical work of the office. Were a clerk appointed they could relieve him of that duty, and give him plenty of time to attend to the outside work.

Should Have a Clerk.
Inspector McCallum should have a clerk to do his work," said a gentleman in touch with the department. "If he were allowed sufficient time to do outside work, he would save the city a great deal of money. Tied up as he is, he manages to do a lot of good. If they had a cheap man to do the clerical work, and allow him more scope and freedom, he would do much more."

It is understood that the council will take this matter up very shortly.

CANUCK FOR POLE

C. S. Wright, of Toronto, To Go With Scott Into Antarctic.

Toronto, June 17.—Mr. C. S. Wright, son of Mr. Alfred Wright, of 60 Crescent road, has the distinction of being one of the physicians on Captain Captain Scott's Antarctic expedition, which has set sail from England for the South Pole.

Mr. Wright is an old Toronto boy, who has been working for the last two years in Cambridge under Professor Sir J. J. Thomson, in the famous Cavendish laboratory. He was educated at Upper Canada College (head boy 1904) and the University of Toronto, where he took first-class honors each year, and finally won the 1851 Exhibition scholarship. He is the second son of Mr. Alfred Wright, Canadian manager of the London and Lancashire Fire Insurance Company.

The work of the physicians, Dr. Simpson and Dr. Wright, will comprise the usual meteorological and magnetic work, and in addition a survey of the currents and conditions in the upper atmosphere will be attempted by sending up specially constructed balloons carrying instruments for registering the temperature and height. Work on ocean currents, atmospheric electricity, radioactivity of the sea and air, salinity of sea water, and analysis of the atmosphere will also be undertaken.

Another point to which Mr. Wright intends to devote considerable attention is the investigation of the crystal structure of ice from the point of view of its age and past history. Should any simple relation be found connecting the crystal structure and the age of ice, considerable light would

at once be thrown upon the origin of the great ice barrier that vast floating sheet, 200 feet high, 200 miles long, and of unknown width, which has so long puzzled the mind of the geologist.

It is interesting to note that another of the members of the expedition, Dr. W. A. R. Mitchell, has also been in the Antarctic, having been with Sir Ernest Shackleton, Lieut. Scott's predecessor in the search for the South Pole.

A JOINT FUNERAL

Hungarian Victims of Falls Fire To Be Buried Together.

Niagara Falls, June 17.—The twelve Austrians who were roasted alive in the fire at Fallsview yesterday morning, will be buried today at 11 a.m. in Drummond Hill Cemetery.

The funeral will take place from Morse's Morgue, Main street, Niagara Falls South. Rev. Father O'Neill, of the Church of Our Lady of Peace, will conduct low mass.

The condition of the husband, wife and child at the General Hospital remains the same, although little hope is held out for the recovery of the woman, who is in a very serious condition, being severely burned about the head and body. The child also suffers terribly agony, its hands and face being badly burned by the flames. The rest of the survivors have been taken into the home view.

There was no inquest evidence last night. If the man or woman at the hospital recover, an inquest may then be held.

Chief Mains is of the opinion that the fire originated from a lighted match being dropped, no notice being

taken of it by the foreigners who had been celebrating.

The foreigners will be buried at the expense of the township of Stamford.
