SEVENTH REGIMENT HOME FROM SARNIA

One man was left in the hospital with acute indigestion, but that was the only case. There is always danger from men on account of excessive bathing and the like, but we were most fortunate.

Sarnia, July 4.—The Seventh Regiment of London, which has been a part of the London boys' tour, left by special train for their homes at 8:45 last night, feeling no doubt much refreshed after their short sojourn among the balmy breezes of Lake Huron Park.

NEGROES TREKKING FEAR WHITE MOBS

An Exodus of Black Folk From Charleston, Mass.

FOLLOWS A LYNCHING

Two Accused of Murder Strung Up in the Street, in View of Great Crowd.

[Associated Press.]

Charleston, Mo., July 4.—An exodus of the negro population of Charleston is in progress following the double lynching yesterday, when Robert Coleman and Sam Fields were hanged by an infuriated mob for the murder of Vm. Fox, a Mississippi County farmer.

Sheriff Culp and his deputies, whom he hastily swore in after the lynching threats were made, were powerless against the crowd which attacked the county jail.

No shots were fired on either side. In the crowd which packed the courthouse yesterday in front of the jail were many women and children, and the authorities feared on that account to resort to shooting. On the outskirts of the crowd were several automobiles, the occupants standing on the seats, the better to watch the attack on the jail.

Waited for Leader.

Seemingly the mob waited only for a leader. The yells for the officers to give up the negroes became louder and more insistent. The mob without warning about 4 o'clock in the afternoon a man seemed to take charge, and the crowd surged forward. A concerted rush was made at the jail, and in a moment the front fence of the yard was trampled down.

The sheriff and his men, begging the men in the van to disperse, were brushed aside.

A railroad tie was shoved forward as a battering ram. Coleman was dragged forth and lynched in the jail yard, while the crowd cheered. A man climbed up a tree and put one of the ropes over a limb. The negro was jerked up and soon swung clear of the crowd. While Coleman dangled, another body of men rushed from the jail dragging and pulling the other negro, Sam Fields. A rope was placed around his neck and the mob, shouting, started west along Court street.

The negro said he would show the men where he and Coleman had hidden the revolver they had used in shooting William Fox, the man whose death the crowd avenged. The men in charge, after a short parley, decided to take the negro to find the revolver. The men still about his neck and drawn tightly by his captors, Fields was thrown into a carriage. Followed by the mob on foot, in carriages, and in automobiles, the crowd started to the jail, where the shooting, half a mile out of town. After going part way the negro told the captors he "guessed" after all he could not find the spot.

A stop was then made and Fields was jerked out of the carriage. Without any preliminary the rope was tossed over the limb of a tree and Fields was strung up.

This morning his body was still swinging. Hundreds from the city and country visited the place and gazed curiously at the tree and the hanging body. The body of the other negro was allowed to hang until 6 o'clock, when it was cut down by several persons who wanted pieces of the rope as souvenirs. For some time afterwards the body lay on the ground.

BRITONS GLAD TO PUT AWAY BLACK

With July Comes End of Mourning and Public and Dealers Rejoice.

London, July 4.—However much the country lamented the death of King Edward, every one was glad when the period of full mourning came to an end, and that the rule of the public should not follow the rule of the court to keep in mourning for a full year; and, needless to say, drapers, milliners and tailors pleasantly anticipated the end of the public mourning, bringing with it a revival in trade. And so it has. In fact, business is booming.

Same in the royal household any or every color may now be used, and every one who speaks with authority in matters of women's dress agrees in declaring that, provided the weather is favorable, this is going to be a white summer.

Half Mourning Still.

At the same time society generally is much influenced as to its wear by court mourning, and so long as black rules among those who move in its circles there will be no disposition in the more exclusive ranks to assume bright colors. In society half mourning will not be cast aside during July, because the dressmaking departments of the fashionable firms or at the court modistes' there has been great activity in turning out costumes which will be suitable for the rest of the season in London, as well as for the country.

With either grays or mauves it has been possible to solve the problem of putting on a bright appearance while still preserving the conventional half mourning. Quite early in the year there was every sign that gray in all its shades, from delicate pearl to mole, would have been a marked feature in
