NEW LINE READY BY NEXT AUTUMN
Canadian Northern Will Rush Work On the Extensions Through Ontario.

Hamilton, Dec. 1.—That the Canadian Northern Railway will have its line from Toronto to Hamilton completed next year, probably by the early fall, was the assurance given yesterday afternoon by William Phillips, of Toronto, general eastern agent of the company, who was here to arrange for the opening of offices in the Federal Life Building on Dec. 1. Mr. Phillips was accompanied by George R. Fairhead, who will be the company's commercial agent in Hamilton, and C. H. Green, who has been appointed traveling freight agent for this district.

Mr. Phillips' statement about the time the road will be constructed here is interesting as it is the first official announcement in that connection. The company is busy at present with its Toronto entrance, and it will not be long before gangs are started at both the Toronto and Hamilton ends rushing the construction work.

As soon as the Hamilton line is completed the work of building to Niagara Falls will be proceeded with, and later the company will turn its attention to a line through Western Ontario to Windsor, passing through Brantford, Woodstock and London. It is understood that the C. N. R. has under consideration the question of whether the Toronto to Hamilton line shall be steam or electric. While this has not been settled yet, the chances are that a steam road—a trunk line from Toronto to the Falls and west to Windsor—will be built with electric feeders throughout the peninsula.

MEDALS FOR THE BRAVE
Arrangements for Presentation to the Rescuers of Miss Simmons.

BUSY SESSION AHEAD FOR COUNTY COURT
Six Cases Altogether, Several Being of Unusual Interest.

Six cases were entered today for trial at the county court sittings, which commence at the court house on Tuesday next before Judge Macbeth. Two of these are non-jury.

The cases are as follows:
Patrick Walsh, a real estate agent of this city, sues James McDonald, also of this city for \$131.25, commission on sale of property at \$31 Dundas street, in 1906. J. W. Metherall was the purchaser, and according to the plaintiff, he paid \$52.50 for the property, being a part of the purchase price, and the defendant, J. W. Metherall, is acting for the plaintiff, and Gibbons, Harper & Gibbons for the defence.
George H. Hiley, a London Township farmer, brings action against Alexander McNeil, a Melbourne hotelkeeper, for the return of \$155 paid for a horse, or for damages of that amount. On Aug. 2, 1910, according to the statement of claim, the plaintiff purchased from the defendant a horse, being told that on the same evening he could drive from Melbourne to his home in Hilderton. The plaintiff alleges that the horse was defective, and that for this reason he was returned to McNeil on the same night. Hiley wants his money back. Meredith, Judd & Meredith for the plaintiff; J. M. McEvoy for the defendant.

Jury Cases.
Shields Bros., lumber dealers, of Meaford, sue for \$210 interest on that amount at 5 per cent since April, 1909. John McLoughlin, a brick manufacturer of this city, the defendant, enters a counter claim for \$274.75 and damages, claiming that a certain contract relating to the delivery of cord wood was not carried out. The statement of claim asserts that in April, 1909, Shields Bros. agreed to deliver about 250 cords of wood to McLoughlin. They contend that they were not paid the full amount. The defendant alleges that the agreement was that about 1,000 cords of station timber was to have been cut and delivered, and that as a matter of fact but 255½ cords of culled stuff arrived in London. J. C. Elliott, of Glencoe, is acting for the plaintiff, and Gibbons, Harper & Gibbons for the defendant.

Hugh McLean, an Elfrid farmer, alleges that his next neighbor, Hector McNeil, on Sept. 22, 1910, owned a vicious mare, and knew the animal's disposition, but negligently allowed the mare to run at large in a field. On that day the mare jumped the line fence, and ran over the plaintiff's stallion, inflicting injuries that caused the horse's death after a great deal of doctoring. McLean asks \$400 damages. Meredith, Judd & Meredith for the plaintiff; J. C. Elliott, of Glencoe, for the defendant.

George Rawlings, a London laborer who was injured while employed by the Stratford Bridge and Iron Works on the new hydro-electric station east of the city, sues for \$500 damages. While working as a laborer at a forge beneath a scaffold 25 feet above the ground a 12-pound sledge and a number of other tools fell on his head, rendering him unconscious. His ribs were broken, his shoulder-blade cracked, and his scalp very badly lacerated. Meredith, Judd & Meredith for the plaintiff; Harding & Owens, of Stratford, for the defendants.

The statement of claim in the fourth case on the list alleges that the plaintiff, James A. Watt, a Metcalfe farmer, purchased a stallion from John D. and Archie Campbell, of Brook Township, Lambton, horse dealers. The price agreed upon was \$450, \$100 cash being paid, and a promissory note given for the remainder. This was indorsed by P. S. Watt. The horse did not prove of any value for the purpose for which it was purchased, so Watt asks for the return of his money and note, as well as \$300 damages. J. M. McEvoy is acting for the plaintiff, and J. C. Elliott, of Glencoe, for the defendants.

It is expected that a number of other cases will be entered this afternoon, and that there will be sufficient business before the court for a ten-days' session.

PROMISSORY NOTE CASE NOW ON AT OTTAWA

Action That Has Had Two Decisions Now Before Highest Tribunal

The case of the Sovereign Bank vs. Daniel McIntyre, a hog buyer, is being heard before the supreme court at Ottawa today. The action brought by the bank for the recovery of \$1,350, alleged to be due on a promissory note given for stock, was originally heard in this city, when a verdict was given in favor of the plaintiff. Mr. J. M. McEvoy, acting for the defendant, carried the matter to the court of appeals at Toronto, where he won the decision on Feb. 12, 1909. The bank has now gone to the highest court in Canada for a decision. Mr. McEvoy is in Ottawa today arguing the case.
