prise in order to furnish a product more cheaply to its own people. "A duty on power would, of course. put a stop to the importation of Canadian electricity, either at Detroit or at any other point where a similar invasion may be planned, and I am told a bill for the purpose will be passed at the coming session.' Mr. Beck's Opinion.

Mr. Beck was shown the foregoing and asked for his opinion. "The Michigan electrical interests," he said, "are making an effort to save a milliondollar plant in Detroit, forgetting that fifteen or twenty millions of American money are invested at Niagara Falls. The company from which we purchase power has a lot of American capital behind it. So if they prevent the exportation of power at Detroit, they are liable to cause some trouble to the American investors at the Falls. Personally, I do not know how they are going to prevent the exportation of power at Detroit, and overlook Buffalo. The principle is the same. However, we have nothing to

do with that matter. "It seems strange, in view of the criticism of Niagara power that the Detroit General Electric, which is adone of the finest steam plants in the world, should fear Niagara power when it has to be trans-
