LONDON STREETS LIKELY TO REMAIN TORN UP

But Little Can Be Done Toward Resurfacing This Fall.

There will be little done towards paving Richmond and Dundas streets this fall. The London street railway may get their rails down, but there will likely be no attempt made to do the concrete and brick work along the track allowance. This is due to the fact that the season is late, and also because the underground conduit system will not be finished. The claim is made that the conduits will have to settle before the city or the company can afford to do the work. It is claimed that the work is not properly stamped, and consequently it will settle quite a bit. "It will be nine months more at least before the streets are finished," said a citizen yesterday. "Next August or September may see the work completed. There is no more chance of completing it this year than I have to be King of England."

FIRE CHIEF COMPLAINS OF MAZE OF WIRES

Hydro-Electric Work in London Not Within Provisions of Laws.

Fire Chief Aitken is not enamored of the strangle of wires down town, and told No. 3 committee as much last night, when he sent a letter to them regarding the matter. His letter was as follows:

"I wish to draw your attention to the manner the hydro-electric poles and wires are being erected in the city, and especially in the business district. "First,—There are a number of poles they are erecting that are far too short, and do not come within the provision of the bylaw regarding the same, and when the wires are placed on them under others erected on other companies' poles, they will form a regular wire fence 20 feet or more in height in front of several of the wholesale warehouses, and which will make it impossible to put up ladders to those buildings if needed in case of fire.

"Second,—In several places their wires are in close contact with the fire alarm system, which is very dangerous in this construction. On several occasions they have interfered with and broken our lines without any notification to the department, and caused a lot of trouble with our bells. I have notified the electrical engineers from time to time in regard to the above, but they apparently paid no attention whatever.

"A Recommendation. "I would strongly recommend that your committee take such action as is necessary to compel the engineers in charge to construct their lines that they will not be a menace to the efficiency of this department, and also to the public safety."

Mayor Beattie informed the committee that there was no bylaw making it necessary to erect 60-foot poles down town. That referred altogether to the London Electric not to the city system.

"The citizens made a mistake when they voted down a bylaw to put the wires underground," Mayor Beattie claimed.

However, it was decided to send the communication to the water commissioners.

MOTORED INTO CANAL

Occupants of Auto Have Narrow Escape at Dunnville.

Dunnville, Sept. 28.—While returning to town in an automobile along the bank of the feeder to the Welland Canal, about four miles from here, this afternoon, an accident in which the lives of four people were endangered occurred. Frank Hyde, proprietor of the Victoria Hotel here, was driving his automobile, in which were his mother and brother, Sidney, of Courthouse, Ont., and his niece, Miss Eva Richardson, of Detroit. Owing to recent rains, the clay road, on the banks were slippery, and in trying to avert a mudhole, Mr. Hyde steered too near the edge of the bank and was unable to stop the machine before it skidded and plunged into the water, about seven feet below, the car turning turtle with all its occupants. Sidney Hyde and Miss Richardson were thrown out when the car first tumbled over.

Frank Hyde, who was thrown into the water, reached shore, and with the assistance of his brother, turned the car over. Mrs. Hyde, who was sitting on the rear seat, was pinned down in the mud by the weight of the car for about three minutes before she was released.

Mrs. Hyde had two ribs broken besides numerous bruises.

Sarnia, Sept. 28.—One of the most successful fairs that has been held in the county of Lambton, and more particularly in the town of Sarnia, for many a year was held under the auspices of the West Lambton Agricultural Society here on Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. NAPLES PANIC-STRICKEN

Mob Thought Strangers Were Trying to Spread the Cholera.

Rome, Sept. 28.—The official report, issued tonight, states that during the past 24 hours 15 new cases of Asiatic cholera have appeared in the city of Naples, with nine deaths; four new cases and one death in the Province of Naples, outside the city, and three new cases and one death in the Province of Bari. These do not include the so-called cases of gastroenteritis.

A dispatch from Naples says that two strangers seeking lodgings in a poor quarter today aroused the suspicion of the residents, who cried out that they were spreading the cholera. The strangers were attacked by a mob when they attempted to give change to some children, with cries of "Death to the poisoners."
