





#### FOUR FREIGHT CARS PILED IN A HEAP

Mishap On The Grand Trunk

Four freight cars were derailed and iled up in a heap during the night at Komoka on the Grand Trunk, the trouble rew of an extra west-bound freight According to the report submitted by he men in charge of the train, they were aware that the string of cars was on the siding, but ran in to couple with them at a fairly high speed.

#### PATENT MEDICINE WAS NINETY PER CENT "BOOZE"

A Mystery Solved and a License Law Breaker Heavily Punished.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Jan. 25,-One of the most remarkable prosecutions under the liquor license act ever taken in Ontario resulted this morning in the nulcting of Samuel Alex in the sum of \$1,000, imposed as the total fine in five cases in each of which he was fined \$200 and costs, or in default three months' charge. Incidentally, a problem which has been worrying the woods department of the Lake Superior Corporation and the Algoma Central Railway has been solved. For some time past it has been notice that a number of foreigners have boarded trains in a drunken state, though no consignments of liquor could be found Chief Hugh B. Graham, of the Lake Superior Corporation, in the course of his investigation, found a ea taining 14 dozen bottles of Hoffman's pain-healing properties, con evidence before Magistrate Elliott that the stuff in the bottles was \$0 per cent alcohol. The practice had been to put a teaspoonful and a half of the medicine in a tumbler of water, and while the taste was not of the nicest, the effect was said to be "the same."
