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NO TARIFF TO RETARD RECIPROCITY OF BRAINS

Dr. Mayo, Distinguished American Surgeon, Says Exchange of the Two Countries' Talent Must Continue—Some Interesting Clinics.

That while Canada and the United States did not succeed in the completion of its negotiations for mutual trade relations, a reciprocity of brains in the medical profession has existed between the two countries for many years, and must always continue to exist, declared Dr. W. J. Mayo, one of the famous Mayo Brothers, surgeons, of Rochester, Minn., in an address before the Western Medical College Alumni at the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium Monday afternoon.

The fourth annual reunion and clinics were attended by nearly four hundred members of the profession, who were also privileged to hear Dr. Llewellys F. Barker, head of the medical department of Johns Hopkins University, of Baltimore, Dr. Barker, who is now one of the foremost medical men on the continent, is a Western Ontario boy, and his presence at the gathering served to illustrate Dr. Mayo's comment on the "reciprocity of brains."

Methods of Dr. Mayo.

The eminent Rochester surgeon spoke at some length on cancer of the stomach and intestines and illustrated his address with lantern slides, depicting his own methods in certain operations. Dr. Mayo, ofingham, introduced Dr. Mayo, and the conclusion of that address Dr. H. A. McCullum, of this city, assumed the duties of president, and called Dr. Barker. Dr. Barker conducted a clinic that extended over a period of two hours. The doctor explained that he worked under difficulties in view of the fact that his old preceptor, Dr. McKay, of Ingersoll, was in the audience. Dr. McKay, who examined him in pathology, surgery, when he strove for his degree at the University of Toronto, and Dr. Wishart, his examiner in surgical anatomy, for his license to practice medicine in the province, were on the platform.

As to Grave's Disease.

Grave's disease was first dealt with. Dr. Barker explaining different details not long since discovered in connection with the trouble. Medical practice he favored in the treatment, although he would not exclude surgery in certain cases.

Patients brought from city hospitals were carried on to the platform to illustrate certain conditions. A case of hysteria in which a young woman had lost all sensation in the lower extremities excited the most profound interest, experiments of a nature seldom brought to the attention of the medical profession, being followed closely.

Two kidney cases, three rheumatic joint cases, and a blood case completed the clinic, which the audience agreed, contained more information than the members believed could have been crowded into the time placed at the disposal of Dr. Barker. Dr. Mayo was tendered a luncheon by Dr. Wishart in the evening. Dr. Barker left on his return trip to Baltimore at 8 o'clock. The subject of which was to permit of a reunion of the graduates of the Western Medical School was held at Hyman Hall in the evening.

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BIG SUCCESS REPORTED FOR THE BALKAN ARMIES

Twenty Thousand Turks Said To Have Surrendered and Huge Quantities of Supplies Taken—Heavy Fighting at Adrianople at Hand.

London, Oct. 21.—The capitals of the allied Balkan States are claiming victories for their troops over the Turks today. From the field headquarters of the Bulgarians comes word that the Turks are falling back to Adrianople in confusion, burning villages and massacring peasants as they flee. The Greek fleet, says Athens, has blockaded the Island of Lemnos, and that Turkish Island is being occupied by Greek troops.

**TWENTY THOUSAND PRISONERS.**  
The Bulgarians are said to have captured Kirk-Kisse after days of severe fighting around that town. The Serbo-Bulgarian army claims to have taken 20,000 prisoners there, three months' food supplies, and ammunition for a whole army corps. Kirk-Kisse is but 32 miles from Adrianople, and a report says that the victorious invaders pressed on, storming the northern forts of Adrianople, and cut the communication between that city and the outside world. None of these reports has official verification.

**SERBIAN SUCCESS.**  
The Serbians are said to have captured Novavros in the Sanjak of Novi-Bazar, where there was the hottest sort of fighting. Turkish fighting ships are bombarding Varna. They have destroyed the customs house and a monastery there, and there are said to have thrown shells into the Port of Kavarna, north of Varna, where there is neither a garrison nor defence of any sort. It is the military's say that Turkey has committed a breach of international law.

The Serbians have now advanced to within 75 miles of Uskub, their objective point, and are said to have captured Podujevo on the way.

**Sees Turk Victory.**  
Washington, Oct. 22.—Breaking silence for the first time since war broke out in the Balkans, Yousouf Zia Pacha, Turkish ambassador to London, last night issued a statement in which he declared hostilities could be charged directly to the Balkan States, that the trouble would be short lived, and that these countries should be punished for their "impertinency."

The ambassador pointed to the attitude of the European powers in attempting to prevent the outbreak of the present troubles, and to numerous telegrams received from Christians all over the United States offering their services to fight for Turkey as a basis for his statement that the Christians were not persecuted. He declared the Balkan States, discovering that Turkey was about to institute reforms, and, knowing they could not declare a religious war, had attempted to inspire a revolution in Macedonia.

The Turkish army, he continued, was better prepared than ever to go to war as a result of its recent strife with Italy. The Turkish losses were not as great as reported, the ambassador insisted, and Turkey could put 1,000,000 men in the field immediately. He added that the Turkish treasury was in excellent condition, and the revenues had increased \$33,000,000 under the new regime.

Came to the War.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 22.—Fifteen hundred Greeks left Chicago last night to engage in the battles of their country with Turkey. Their departure was the signal for a demonstration on the part of their countrymen, who were to be left behind. In the front ranks the blue and white flag of Greece was displayed, and each of the departing soldiers carried a small Greek flag.

Hocken Selected By Council As Mayor of City of Toronto

Toronto, Oct. 22.—Controller H. C. Hocken was chosen mayor of Toronto yesterday to succeed G. R. Geary, who formally resigned to accept the position of corporation controller, Ald. Alf Maguire was appointed to the board of control to fill Controller Hocken's position. There were three names put forward for the position of mayor: H. C. Hocken, Ald. Dunn's name by Ald. McBride and Sanderson, and Controller Church's by Ald. Dunn, but the latter had no second.

MEXICO NOW FOR DIAZ; MADERO GOVT. DOOMED

Success Attends Rising Led By Nephew of the Exiled President.

Washington, Oct. 21.—If General Felix Diaz has the strength and the genius to follow up the advantage he has already gained from the blow struck at Vera Cruz, all Mexico is his. This is the conclusion reached here after a day of official dispatches from all points within the present zone of the insurrection being led by the nephew of the exiled former president. Dispatches to the state department from Mexico City indicate that the capital is ready to flip to the new leader the very moment he shows signs of increased strength. The city only awaits a second move on the part of Diaz as dramatic and forceful as his capture of the city of Vera Cruz without a blow or a shot. It is even reported that the officers of the federal army in Mexico City are praying that they may not be sent into the field against General Diaz, as they want opportunity to watch the situation passively in order that they may be in a position to join the Diaz cause as soon as it shows signs of winning.

The colonel's special car and the car of the physicians and newspapermen were quickly detached and started for Oyster Bay. Dr. Lambert and Terrell said that the colonel's wound was oozing some, but that he was in excellent condition. They issued the following bulletin: "Col. Roosevelt is very cheerful after a good night's sleep. He is feeling very well and has stood the journey well." Col. Roosevelt and his secretaries were busy on the train until late in the night looking for an old speech of the colonel's on the trusts. This speech has been the basis of recent criticism by William Jennings Bryan, and after a secretary had unearthed it, and Col. Roosevelt had gone over it, he said that it intended to reply to Mr. Bryan's criticism either in a statement or in a speech.

DROPPED DEAD

Mrs. Fraser Was Stricken Suddenly in Petrolia Factory. [Special to The Advertiser.]  
Petrolia, Oct. 21.—Mrs. W. A. D. Fraser, aged 65 years, dropped dead while at work at the Petrolia canning factory this afternoon. Death was due to apoplexy.

Her husband is at present in Blairville, Sask. The remains were taken to Steadman's undertaking rooms. No inquest will be held.

**LOSS IS \$2,000.**

WHITE HOUSE FIGHT CLOSE TO THE END

The Presidential Candidates Are Concentrating Energies on Weak Points.

COL. ROOSEVELT'S PLANS

President to Make One Speech at Big Republican Rally at New York.

[Canadian Press.]

New York, Oct. 22.—Campaign managers are revising plans and altering arrangements for the wind-up of the presidential fight. The injury to Col. Roosevelt, the voluntary withdrawal of Governor Wilson from the stump, and the fact that neither President Taft nor Vice-President Sherman have taken part in the active work of the campaign, have resulted in changing plans in all three of the chief political campaigns.

The ensuing two weeks will witness a concentration of activity in the sections where the respective campaign managers believe the outlook is most favorable for the capture of disputed ground. Governor Johnson, Progressive vice-presidential candidate, is to fill in most of Col. Roosevelt's proposed engagements in the east, and the Democratic leaders are rushing a number of their chief speakers into Pennsylvania and New York to take up the work planned originally for Governor Wilson.

Democratic Campaign.

The Democratic campaign will center in Pennsylvania from this time forth, according to statements made here. A score of Democratic senators and congressmen, who have been speaking throughout the country, will be sent to the Keystone State, in the hope of making inroads on heretofore solid Republican ground.

The Republican fight is also to be quickened in the east, with a concentration of forces in New York. State Secretary of State Knox is to deliver a number of speeches in eastern cities, including Buffalo and New York. It is expected that Senator Lodge and Secretary of the Navy Meyer will join the Republican speaking force, which already includes Secretaries Nagel and Wilson, Former Congressman K. Adam Bede and John M. Harlan, of Chicago, who followed Col. Roosevelt through out his entire western tour, will stump New England and eastern states until the election.

Roosevelt's Plans.

Col. Roosevelt's arrival from Chicago was not expected to alter Progressive plans.

Senator Joseph M. Dixon has determined to make the journey to New York. Col. Roosevelt's doctors, the question of his appearance on Oct. 30 at the big Progressive rally at Madison Square Garden, New York, but Progressive leaders are plain hopeful that the candidate would be able to join Governor Johnson and Oscar S. Straus in that demonstration. Should he speak there, Governor Wilson will probably speak in the same hall at a Democratic rally the following night.

President Taft will make one final campaign speech, according to the announcements from his headquarters. He will speak in New York on Nov. 2 at the dinner to be given to Charles D. Hilles, chairman of the Republican committee, and it is understood that the speech will be in the nature of a "message to the country," such as Governor Wilson is to issue on the same day, through the medium of the "Wilson-Marshall day" demonstrations.

Democratic leaders have determined upon Colorado, Idaho, Nebraska, Kansas, Nevada, and New Jersey as the states where they will concentrate efforts to carry the state legislatures, in the hope of electing Democrats to succeed the Republicans in the United States Senate.
