WINDSOR IS TO HAVE NEW PUBLIC DOCK

Dominion Minister of Public Works Makes Inspection of Site.

Windsor, July 7.—Following a visit of inspection by Hon. F. D. Monk, minister of public works, who arrived here rather unexpectedly on Saturday morning, on the Government yacht Speedy, announcement is made that the new public dock is to shortly become an accomplished fact.

The dock, which is to be erected at the foot of Church street, will be 500 feet in length, and work will be commenced soon. Although the visit of the minister was quite unexpected, Mayor Shepherd boarded the Speedy a few minutes after her arrival to extend a welcome on behalf of the Windsor board of trade, performed a similar duty on behalf of the business men's organization.

Mr. Monk was accompanied by his wife and daughter, Miss Marie; and his son, F. A. Monk. Luncheon was served the party in the afternoon at the Hotel Pontchartrain in Detroit, and in the evening Hon. J. O. Reaume escorted the visitors to the Detroit Motor Boat Club, where they were his guests at an informal supper. The Speedy left late tonight for Sarnia.

WERE DEPORTED

Turks Claimed To Be Collecting Money for Foreign Church.

Sarnia, July 7.—A report was received at police station Saturday that two men who represented themselves as preachers, were going around to various houses soliciting contributions for some foreign church. An officer was sent out to investigate, but was unable to locate the men. Later in the day they were seen in the downtown district and apprehended.

When examined in police court it was found that the men were of Turkish nationality, and came here by way of Windsor from Detroit. They were turned over to the immigration authorities and deported.

NINETEEN COWS KILLED

Lightning Struck Tree Under Which They Were Standing.

Belleville, July 7.—An electric storm that passed over Madoc Township Friday evening was unusually severe. The worst damage reported was on the farm of Alexander McCoy, near Remington post-office. His fine herd of milch cows, numbering nineteen, collected under a tree during the storm. A bolt of lightning struck the tree, and the entire herd of cattle, wedged tightly together, were instantly killed.

THREE GO TO "CHAIR" FOR BRUTAL MURDER

Foreigners Executed at Sing-Sing For Slaying of Farmer's Wife.

Ossining, N. Y., July 8.—Three men, Giuseppe Cirelli, George Williams (a negro), and Santa Zanza, were put to death in the electric chair in quick succession at Sing Sing Prison this morning in the order named. All were convicted murderers.

Cirelli walked to the chair with head erect, and knelt with reverence in prayer just before he was seated for his death. The other two men showed less composure, and Zanza had to be carried and assisted to the chair. Zanza was one of a band of six Italians connected with the murder of Mrs. Mary Hall, wife of Henry Hall, a superintendent of construction on the Croton Aqueduct, on Nov. 9, 1911. His five companions in crime are to be electrocuted at Sing Sing during the week of Aug. 12. In a letter to Governor Dix, Zanza confessed the actual murder of Mrs. Hall, but claimed he was forced to kill her by Angelo Guisto, who had accompanied him to Mrs. Hall's room, and who threatened to shoot him unless he obeyed.

George Williams, the negro, was convicted on circumstantial evidence of the murder of Charles Conklin, station agent on the New York Central Railroad at Croton Lake, on the night of April 8, 1911. Conklin was found lying on the floor of the ticket office with money scattered about. Four bullet wounds in his body told the manner of his death.

Cirelli stabbed Nicoli Paulo on Feb. 4, 1911, in a shack on the Hillside reservoir at Yonkers. Paulo died two days later. Five Italians were in the

shanty. Cirelli threatened to kill them all, and stabbed one of the party, Paulo, attempted to interfere and was killed.

DAVID MARSHALL FOR THE SENATE

Globe Says He May Succeed the Late Senator Wilson.

The Globe, under a London date line, says today:

Major Thomas Beattie, M. P., is still out of the city, but his friends state positively that he was promised the next senatorship available for a Western Ontario man. Dr. Roome, ex-M. P., is mentioned, however, as a possibility. On the other hand, the late Senator Wilson of St. Thomas may not be succeeded by a London man at all. It is not probable that the vacancy will be filled by Mr. D. Marshall, M. P. for East Elgin. Mr. Marshall is prominently connected with the canners' combine, which used its influence so effectively in the late campaign against the proposal to reduce the cost of living. The canners' combine would then have a representative in the Commons, Mr. F. R. Lalor, M. P. for Haldimand, and a representative in the Senate.

In the event of Major Beattie being the choice, there is considerable speculation as to who would be nominated to represent London in the House of Commons. It is generally conceded that Mr. Marshall Graydon or Ald. Percy Moore could have the honor if either wanted it.

PORTUGUESE ROYALISTS SPEEDILY SUPPRESSED

Army Advancing to Frontier Blocked By the Federal Forces.

[Canadian Press.]
Lisbon, July 8.—The long expected royalist movement began yesterday, but according to official information it has been checked. The outbreaks were confined for the most part to some small districts in the north. Telegraphic communication, which was cut at Villa Real and Braganza, has been restored and the railroads have been cleared of obstructions.

It appears that Captain Couceiro, the royalist leader, with the bulk of his forces, well armed, is encamped near Montalegre, but the Government has troops along the frontier capable, it is announced, of exterminating the royalists if they show fight.

An official note says that the garriest at Montalegre has been reinforced, and has stopped the advance of 400 royalists under Couceiro. Another small band, however, is advancing along the road from Verim, and a column has been sent to Chaves to engage it.

Arrests continue in various parts of the country and the royalists are offering little or no resistance.

THOMAS LEWIS FELL DEAD FROM MOWER

Prominent McGillivray Farmer Was Stricken Very Suddenly.

Lucan, July 8.—Thomas Lewis, a farmer living on the second concession of McGillivray, died very suddenly today. He left the house after breakfast, and was out mowing a field. Suddenly he fell from the machine, and before assistance could reach him had passed away. Deceased was 61 years old, and had resided in the district for a long time. Besides his wife he leaves one daughter.

CROPS SUFFERING

Pasture in Kent is Burning Up Under Blazing Sun.
