## FEDERALS LOST HEAVILY IN FIGHT WITH REBELS

[Canadian Press.]  
Eagle Pass, Sept. 8.—One hundred Federals and eight Constitutionalists were killed in the battle near San Buenaventura, Mexico, on Saturday, according to Constitutionalists' advice today.

Reports received at Eagle Head quarters with Piedras Negras assert that the Federals were routed and fled in disorder toward Puerto Carmen.

Gen. Jesus Carranza, brother of the Constitutional commander-in-chief, Venustiano Carranza, left today for San Buenaventura to assume personal command of the rebel troops.

**ABANDON ATTACK.**  
El Paso, Texas, Sept. 8.—A courier arriving here today from Casas Grandes, where Gen. Francisco Villa and his rebel forces were encamped three days ago, brought messages to the rebel junta of this city which stated that the plans to attack Chihuahua City had been abandoned.

Villa is moving northward toward the border with all of his forces. Gen. Carranza, who conferred with Villa south of Chihuahua, is reported to be moving toward Sonora with a small bodyguard in an attempt to pacify the Yuki Indians with the Sonora troops, who are threatening to revolt against both rebel and Federal forces if the Yuki territory is not divided up among the Indians.

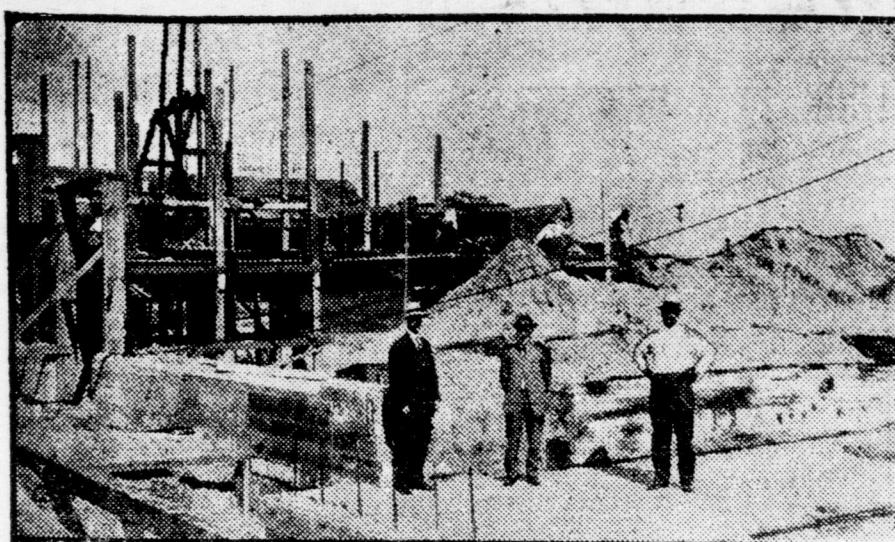

## SEVEN CARLOADS OF PEACHES MARKED HERE ON SATURDAY

One hundred and fifty tons of peaches, representing about 10,000 baskets, or seven carloads, found buyers in London Saturday. The amount might have been even greater, had it not been for a scarcity of baskets in the Grimsby district, from which point most of the fruit was shipped. It was the biggest "peach day" of the year, and local fruit men state that in spite of the large supply, they were all cleaned out by Saturday night. Prices ranged at from 25 to 60 cents a basket, the prevailing figure being 35 to 40 cents, commanded the best on the market.

Preparations are being made for another tremendous shipment on Saturday next. "The Saturday of Fair week is always a great day for peaches," said one dealer, "and it is probable that a still greater quantity will be marketed that day."

Fruits are so plentiful as to be almost a drug on the market. They were sold for 15 cents a basket Saturday, and even at that, large quantities remained unsold. This fact combined with the "basket famine" will mean that tons of them will never be shipped from the district in which they were grown.

## AROUND THE CITY HALL

**Want Report Discussed.**  
While nothing but a formal meeting of the council for this evening is in prospect, it is expected that a request will be made for the submission of the Warfield report on electrification of the London and Port Stanley Railway, to a committee of the council as a whole. **Painting Is In Progress.**  
Exterior painting of the section of the new city hall occupied by the water commission, has already been started. When the exterior of the city hall will be started is problematical. City Treasurer James S. Bell has found his trusty dagger. All is now serene in the treasury department since the long-protecing dagger has been returned to its former spot of honor, beside the treasurer's wicket.

**City Hall Committee Meets.**  
There will be a meeting of the city hall committee of the council at 4:30 this afternoon. Reports received from the various minor alterations to the new city hall premises are the only questions scheduled to come before the aldermen.

**Meat Inspection To Come Up.**  
Meat inspection will again be brought up at the monthly meeting of the board of health Tuesday afternoon. The question was sent on to the council by the board some time ago. Other than to refer it to the fire, water and light committee, no action has been taken by the council. The committee decided to have a conference with the board to say the least, before the matter is brought up.

**Building Still Good.**  
Building prospects for September still continue excellent. Over \$30,000 permits have been issued in the eight days of the month from Building Inspector A. M. Piper's office.

There will be well over \$100,000 before the month ends. The fair grounds buildings—\$22,000—and the \$22,000 Egerton Street Baptist Church will help swell this total.

**HERB PURDY FOUND KILLED**

**Prominent Aldboro Farmer Met Mysterious Death In His Own Barn.**

**HE MAY HAVE SUICIDED**

Wardsville, Sept. 8.—Herbert Purdy, aged 48, was found dead in his barn in Aldboro Township, about a mile from here, today with his face shot off.

According to the story of Mr. Metcalfe, the hired man, he and Purdy went out to the barn early today to considerable damage about the place, try and kill a mink that was doing harm to the milk at breakfast time Purdy told him to go on into the house and get his food, and he thought stay and watch for the mink with the shotgun.

Metcalfe, after going in, heard the gun go off, and hurrying out, found Purdy lying dead with his face completely shot away. How the shooting happened has not yet been learned.

Purdy's wife died two years ago, leaving him with two little boys and a girl. Of late his health had not been good, but he had not acted in any way which would indicate that he contemplated suicide.

An investigation will be made.

**Killing of Abe Heavenly Judgment**

Tokio, Sept. 8.—Anarchistic expressions in the Japanese press in connection with the agitation over the killing of Japanese at Nanking and by the assassination of the director of the political bureau of the Japanese foreign office, Morihiro Abe, led to the suppression of the Nishiku Shinbun, an independent newspaper.

The journal asserted that the punishment of the spies of Yuan Shi-kai, the Chinese provisional president, had just commenced, that the murder of Director Abe was "a heavenly judgment," and that other assassinations would follow.

The members of the Japanese cabinet are being constantly protected by detectives.

**British Scientists To Discuss Ether**

Sir Oliver Lodge Will Contest New German Theory.

[Canadian Press.]

Manchester, Eng., Sept. 8.—From Sept. 10 to Sept. 17 the annual meetings of British Association will be held here. Hundreds prominent in various branches of science and others whose work is in the field of sociology will gather to listen to the reading of papers and to engage in discussions.

These gatherings of the British Association have come to be regarded as distinct milestones for the scientific world of the United Kingdom, and on this occasion, as usual, new theories are expected to be advanced and new science discovered.

Last year Professor Sir Edward Albert Schaeffer presided over the association and launched certain suggestions regarding the origin of life that excited much controversy. Sir Oliver Lodge will take "ether" for the subject of his address, and will consider some theories of the structure and matter of the universe.

Ether has failed to respond to the subtlest efforts made to detect its objective existence, and a new school led by Professor A. Einstein, of the Uni-

University of Zurich, and Professor Max Planck, rector of the Berlin University, have come forward to frame a model of the universe without ether, known as the theory of relativity. Part of Sir Oliver Lodge's address will be a protest against this. He is expected to argue partly on philosophical grounds against the assumption that what is not palpable is non-existent. One of the principal discussions will be on the cost of living.

## Fire Throws 300 Men Out of Work

Ottawa, Sept. 7.—Three hundred men are thrown out of work as the result of a fire in the timber mill of the J. R. Booth Industries here today at noon. Damage to the extent of \$100,000, was caused by the blaze, the origin of which is a mystery. The mill destroyed was only rebuilt three years ago, new machinery being installed at the time. Splendid work by the firemen prevented the flames spreading to the other buildings owned by the same firm.

# A Weak Heart

"An interesting British report suggests that science has prolonged the lives of very young city folks, but not of the middle-aged. A series of tables compiled from reports of the Registrar-General and covering seventy years shows that for males between five and ten years of age the death rate has declined sixty-four per cent, while for those between forty-five and fifty-five years of age it has declined only three per cent—and for the next decade there is an actual increase of mortality. For both men and women between the ages of forty-five and sixty-five there is no decrease in the death rate. Doctor Newsholme finds that for both men and women in this period of middle life diseases of the heart and blood-vessels were registered as the causes of about one-third of the total deaths.

"Apparently, then, for those who reach middle life in fairly good physical condition the heart is the chief source of danger. Fortunately, everybody knows that excessive use of intoxicants and tobacco and coffee weaken the heart.

"At this season, when New Year's vows are falling like leaves of autumn, we abstain from urging anybody to stop drinking or smoking or overindulgence in coffee. Go ahead—if you think your heart will stand it!"
