WILL MOVE PRISONERS FROM SHIP TO SHORE

LONDON, March 16 (Correspondence of the Canadian Press) .- Three of the nine ships utilized by the British Government as "prison ships" for the internment of prisoners of war at a cost of nearly half a million dollars a month have now been taken off, and it is expected that all the others will be vacated by the end of April, and all prisoners provided for on shore. The number of prisoners on board those still in the service is as follows: Ascania, 1,400; Scotian, 1,100; La Manitoba, 1,200; Saxonia, 2,300; Ive nia, 1,600, and Royal Edward, 1,200.


