

## MAYOR ENPHATIC, WON'T SIGN CHECKS FOR H. J. GLAUBITZ

Up to Council and Commission  
Now After Vote of  
Aldermen.

Tancock, seconded by Ald. Wilson, that the matter be left with the mayor to settle as he sees fit, was lost.

## COST OF SCHOOL ABOVE ESTIMATES

Proposed Riverview Structure  
Will Be Higher Than  
Expected.

### COMBINE IN ONE TENDER

Brick Contractor Will Be  
Asked to Undertake  
All Work.

Riverview School is going to cost considerably more than the board of education expected. The members of No. 2 committee realized this last night when they came to open tenders for the contracts. None of these was accepted, and the committee will not make its decision until the architects have reported on a suggestion made by Trustee Dr. Teasdale, that the lowest tender for the brickwork be asked to supervise the whole of the work, sub-letting the various contracts for carpenter work, heating and plumbing, etc., to the tenderers whose bids for these separate contracts were the lowest.

A number of tenders were received from contractors who submitted a bid price for the complete work, but the lowest of these was nearly \$4,000 more than the original estimate. The trustees therefore, examined the separate tenders for the different trades represented, and at first came to the conclusion that, by accepting the lowest in each case the total cost would be about \$35,000, exclusive of furnishings, architects' fees and grading, etc. The requisition put to the city council for this school was for \$50,000, and also exclusive of the items mentioned.

Then, however, it was discovered that the estimated cost of iron work had not been counted in, and the lowest tender for this work brought the total cost higher than that of the lowest bid. The contractor had submitted a price for plumbing and heating which was nearly as much lower than that of his nearest competitor as the steel and ornamental iron item, but as his tender was not accompanied by a marked check for a percentage of his tender price, as demanded in the advertisement calling for tenders, it had been ignored up to this time. But now the trustees felt that, although such a course was rather unethical, they would be justified in accepting this man's tender if he could be persuaded to rectify the omission of a guarantee check, since the only other tender, although he was to call for fresh tenders, although even in the latter case fear was expressed that no lower prices than those submitted could be got.

It was then that Dr. Teasdale suggested asking the lowest tenderer for the brick work to take over the other contracts at the prices named in the lowest tender in each case, in which event, the doctor pointed out, the contractor would be responsible for the guarantee covering the whole work. The suggestion was seized on eagerly and the contractor in question called on the telephone immediately. He agreed to the proposal, but the committee thought it safer not to give out the amounts of the various tenders until the architects had secured a written ratification of the verbal agreement.

At first the trustees were very seriously concerned over the fact that the cost of building the school would be considerably more than the estimate on which they had based their requisition for debentures. However, it was pointed out that the estimate had been prepared on the basis of a ten-roomed school, but that later it was decided that eleven rooms were absolutely necessary and that the specifications on the tenders were based called for eleven rooms. The architects pointed out, also, that the specifications called for a number of items not usually included in the estimate of the cost of building a school, but provided for subsequently as extras.

The matter of the purchase of the federal square land will be gone into at a later meeting of the board of control. The notice of motion of Ald. Merryfield that Dr. Pingel be appointed medical health officer at a salary of \$2,000 a year was referred to the board of control.

A notice of motion of Ald. Lerner that steps be taken to have the sanitary arrangements in the G. T. R. station and Springbank improved was referred to the board of health.

Ald. Lerner also gave notice of motion to have the aldermen elected for two years, on the ground that under present conditions they are not enabled to work satisfactorily. He suggested that the highest six be chosen the first year.

Dr. James D. Wilson was elected county jail physician, by the Middlesex County Council at the first sitting of its June session, Monday afternoon. Eight physicians applied for the position; Dr. Wilson received the largest number of votes with Dr. McWilliams second. The names voted upon were: Doctors F. R. Clegg, J. D. Wilson, K. T. McLean, W. E. Watson, Robert Ferguson, J. McWilliams, T. C. Cowan, W. A. Thompson.

Apply for Grants.  
Amongst a number of miscellaneous communications to the council were letters asking grants for the following: The Dominion Tactile Press, of Toronto, publishers of magazines for the blind; the East Middlesex Teachers' Association; the Women's Institute of East and North Middlesex; asked \$25 each. These were referred to the committees in charge.

Smallpox outbreaks in the county several months ago will cost the county over \$550; Mosca township, \$140, and North Dorchester, \$424. The London Health Association statement for the year ending March 31, 1914, showed that the Byron Sanatorium, for \$301.50 will be taken up by the finance committee today.

A communication from the provincial treasurer states that one mill on the dollar, as a war tax, must be collected by the county on all rateable property in Middlesex, and a statement prepared before December 31.

**Resolution of Sympathy.**  
A resolution of sympathy was unanimously carried by the council, for the family of the late James Hodgins, reeve of London township, who died since the last meeting of the council. The resolution speaks of the loss which the council has suffered in the death of Reeve Hodgins, who for over a quarter of a century was one of the Middlesex council.

The resolution will be presented to the family of the late councillor. B. C. Brooks, reeve of London township, was appointed to take the place of the late reeve on all committees in the council.

Dr. Carrington, of Stratford, was suggested by Councillor S. Baker, to all the places of the late Richard Avery on the trustee board of the Stratford high school.

The councillors will go to the Lucan race meet, on Thursday, June 10, if business permits. They will visit Stratford today to inspect the house of refuge and the hospital.

**20 LONDON YOUTHS  
HELD IN WOODSTOCK  
CHARGED WITH THEFT**

Taken by Police as They Were Entering  
for a Stratford.

WOODSTOCK, June 7.—Geo.
