VON HINDENBURG SAYS WAR'S CONCLUSION IS IN HANDS OF ALLIES

Declares Nobody Knows When Peace Will Come.

WILL CONTINUE FIGHT

Famous German Denies That Western Line Is To Be Shortened.

BERLIN, Oct. 30 .- "The situation is as good as possible, and all will be well

also in the future.' Thus Field Marshal von Hindenburg hief of the German general staff, described the present war situation to a representative of the Vienna Neue Freie Press, whom he received at headquarters in the presence of Gen, von Ludendorf, first quartermaster-general.

Firm Will to Win Only End. Gen. Ludendorf interjected: "Tell your Austrian friends that there is only one efficient means for ending the war; a firm will to end the war by victory. Every soldier and all others must work Every soldier and all others must work together; they must realize that no way but war leads to peace. Munition is not all; not grenades, but the morale of the troops brings the final decision, and the morale of the German and Austro-Hungarian troops is superior to that of all our adversaries. Nevertheless, munitions mean much in this war. At a previous visit the field marshal told you; 'The main thing is discipline.' That is true. Discipline is based on the complete education of every individual man." dividual man."
Asked whether there was any chance

that the war would be culminated by a decisive blow, Gen, von Ludendorf said: "Perhaps. The trend of events must show this. I prefer to make no statement." Says Russians Being Exhausted.

As to whether the Russian masses shall be exhausted, Field Marshal von Hindenburg replied:

"They are already becoming so; the Russian army commanders have charged themselves with that. There is no doubt also that new masses will grow up in Russia. 
