LORD ROBERTS SCHOOL OPENED LAST NIGHT, ONE OF CITY'S BEST

Pupils and Parents Filled Big Auditorium to Capacity.

IMPORTANCE OF WORK

Educational Standards Must Be Kept at Highest, Urge the Speakers.

Parents of pupils of the school, and citizens from all parts of the city, filled the large auditorium of the new Lord Roberts school on Princess avenue, to its capacity, when the dedication ceremony was held last night. Many stood at the doors and tables were improvised as seats. The auditorium, however, formed by making the kindergarten room, the principal's room one, proved perfectly satisfactory from an acoustic standpoint.

The invocation was made by Rev. H. H. Hingham of Talbot Street Baptist Church. His address, which followed dealt with the progress of educational work, "fair-minded citizens," he said, "will not begrudge the extra cost for this work, which is of the most important nature. When they can spend thousands to 'put London on the lake' surely they can spare something for the betterment of the coming generation. At the time of the Napoleonic wars the truth was developed that babies are made, not born. The year 1890 produced such men as Gladstone, Lord Tennyson, Abraham Lincoln, Oliver Holmes, and other leaders of their century. The year 1916 will produce something, while the glory of many of the battles of the period is forgotten.

Education Invaluable.
"If you give every boy and girl an education you give them something of which they can never be deprived. You may give them riches, but time may use these to vanish; money can work them that use them for the useless to the community, but an education, never."

Replying to the criticism sometimes made that there is no spiritual side to school life, he said that this was not so. Passages from the Bible formed many of the lessons in the school. Sacred passages were read each day, and prayer opened the day.

"It would be usurping the function of the home to bring the teaching of the Bible into the schools," he said. "It would be an imposition to place on the teachers this duty, which should be done by the home. The home is primarily where the Bible should be taught to the children."

A. E. Silverwood, chairman of the board of education, next addressed the audience, placing before it the situation of the school board had to face. The year 1885, he said, marked the close of a school-building period. This was at the time of the construction of the Simcoe street school. Until 1907 most important work along this line was done. Between then and 1910 over twenty rooms were added to schools in the city and the heating system of the school board improved.

The Lord Roberts school of completed this year was the seventh important school built within the past six years, at a total cost of about \$30,000.

The citizens are beginning to show an increasing interest in the work. This is the best-attended opening exercises of any held in recently-built schools.

"No teaching staff in the city averages higher ability than that of the Lord Roberts school," said school inspector C. B. Edwards in his address.

"Dr. Bryant, the principal, has worked for harmony and has found that it produces the best results. The highest compliment that can be paid to him is that 'everybody likes everybody on the staff.'"

"The teacher is a craftsman; some because of their personality and magnetism are artists. Both work to produce the highest type of citizenship. The teachers have more to do with the government of the nation than any other class in it. They rule the children, the children rule the mothers, and in most cases the mothers rule the husbands, who rule the country."

"More stress is being placed now on physical standards. Educational experts are beginning to realize that bodily health is the foundation of success. They are beginning to learn that the cause of failures on final examinations is in many cases due to the physical condition of the student, and are taking steps to better the situation, and physical culture now forms an important part of the school curriculum."

Principal Speaks.
S. J. Radcliffe of the Normal School emphasized the importance of education in national and civic life. He complimented the board of education and the citizens who had built in that portion of the city. It was a mark of the increasing interest in educational affairs and proof that the citizens realized the importance of training children.

Trustee Harry Hayman, the next speaker, dealt with the past work of the board of education. He paid high tribute to the board and the citizens who had built in that portion of the city. At the conclusion of the program, nearly all the visitors took the opportunity of inspecting the building. All the rooms were thrown open to the citizens and members of the staff explained the system in use. The manual training and domestic science departments proved a centre of interest.

CLERKS HEAR LECTURE ON BUSINESS EFFICIENCY

Raising Salaries Produces Good Results—Says J. J. Foote.

John J. Foote, vice-president of the McClary Company, delivered an address to a large body of clerks at the Y.M.C.A. last evening, the subject of his talk being "Business Efficiency."

Mr. Foote explained how it was possible to adopt a more efficient standard of conducting any class of business, and by so doing increase the business.

He suggested that a good method of increasing efficiency on the part of clerks was by an increase in salary. This, he thought, usually acted as an incentive to more efficient and energetic work.

Educational methods should be employed more by firms and the effects would tend to better work in general. He cited several instances of savings that can be effected in cost and production by the adoption of more efficient and scientific methods.

The railways of the United States by the adoption of more scientific methods and by conducting their business along more systematic and scientific lines have managed to save a million dollars over and many other large plants without increasing their size or capacity have increased their business 500 per cent by a re-arrangement and better handling of their employees," said Mr. Foote.
