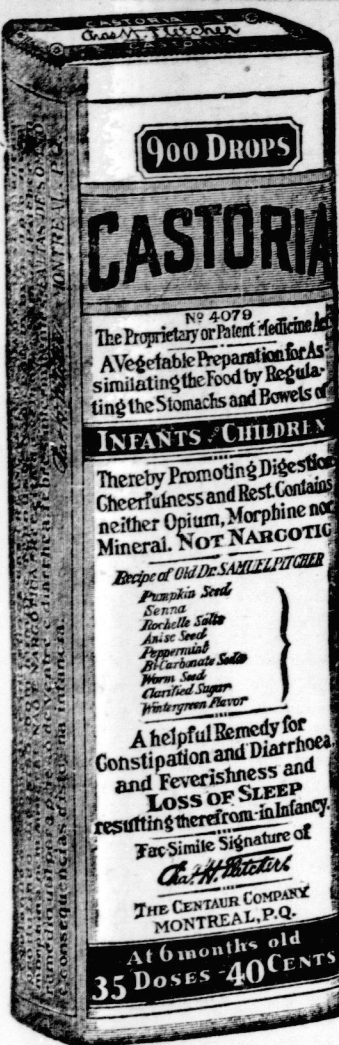

MOTOR CYCLIST IS SERIOUSLY INJURED IN CRASH WITH RIG

Young Woodstock Man Now In Hospital—Companion Is Unhurt.

Woodstock, June 6.—Wallace Taylor, 19, of this city, met with a serious accident late last night, and is today in Woodstock hospital suffering from injuries the extent of which are at the present unknown. Taylor was driving a motorcycle toward the city, and when about two miles north, while going at a high rate of speed, he dashed into a horse and buggy. The impact threw Taylor with great force to the ground.

He was picked up unconscious and rushed to the hospital, where it required 50 stitches to sew up the wounds in the lower part of his abdomen. A friend riding in the side-car was uninjured, nor were the occupants of the buggy, who were also thrown out.

The death took place today of George Trickey, for 30 years a well-known cabinetmaker of this city. Deceased was born in Gananoque, Frontenac county. Before coming to Woodstock he lived for a time in Chatham. His death followed a very short illness.

MEIGHEN TO FACE HARDER TASK THAN THAT OF PREMIER

Visit To England Will Prove Real Test of His Statesmanship.

CANADA THE LEADER

Important Place in Empire's Affairs Depends On Premier's Ability.

QUEBEC, Que., June 6.—By Gratton O'Leary, Staff Correspondent of the Canadian Press, Limited.—With the first parliamentary session as prime minister over, Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen today is on his way to London, where, for the coming month, he will be called upon to play a not less difficult part on the stage of world affairs. The conference of prime ministers, which opens within the historic precincts of No. 10 Downing street, on June 21, is the first of its kind to be held in the Empire's history. Differing from the Imperial War Conference, which concerned itself solely with imperial affairs, from the committee on imperial defence, devoted solely to problems of war, and differing also from the imperial war cabinet, a conference of selected ministers of the various empire governments, which has no successor in peace, the present conference represents the first attempt to have the Dominions formulate a foreign policy for the empire, hitherto the function of Great Britain alone.

Will Be Real Test.
Called primarily to lay the foundation for a greater constitutional gathering to come, the conference of prime ministers owes its genesis to the imperial conference of 1917. At that gathering, held during the black days when the British army in France was fighting with its back to the wall, the statesmen of the empire, in a moment of crisis, adopted a resolution declaring that the relations of the empire were too important and intricate a question to be dealt with then, and should form the subject of a special conference to be held after the coming of peace. A year later, when the Dominion ministers met again at the peace conference, the question was further discussed, and in view of the importance attached to the problem, it was decided that there should be a preliminary conference at which the spokes-work could be done for the matters with which the constitutional conference would deal. It is this preliminary conference that is now being held, although with the rapid march of the years, the fact that the Anglo-Japanese Alliance, which expires in July, is to be dealt with, the gathering will be dealt with subjects vastly more important than called for by the original plan.

Had Six Months Study.
The original agenda of the conference, prepared by the British Government and submitted to Mr. Meighen about six months ago, contained but four subjects. Since that time, however, and notably since Mr. Winston Churchill entered the colonial office, several new questions have been added, all with questions of the question of military and naval defence. He has taken the ground, and he will urge his position, that the time for the place for the consideration of the problem of armaments, deal with subjects vastly more important than called for by the original plan.

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of the League of Nations and of disarmament, is not likely, coming from South Africa, to desire naval action to satisfy opinion at home. The most important question of foreign policy to come before the conference will be the Anglo-Japanese alliance. This treaty, first entered into in 1902, broadened in 1911, and renewed in 1911, expires on July 12, and, unless renewed before that time, becomes terminable upon one year's notice from either of the parties concerned. To Canada, a Pacific power, the question is of first importance, and as it has been intimated from London that the British Government will not renew the treaty unless the dominions favor its renewal, great deal will depend upon the attitude Mr. Meighen may adopt. Thus far he has not publicly proclaimed his position on the question, but there is good reason for believing that he will support the treaty's renewal only upon the condition that it is satisfactory to the United States. Were he left to his own inclinations, it is probable that he would adopt the advice tendered by Mr. Rowell in England, and stated that more had been done in the past few months toward lifting the embargo than had been done during the past 25 years.
