AWAIT VERDICT IN ARBUCKLE TRIAL

Anxious Crowds Throng the Courtroom To Hear Jury's Decision.

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Dec. 2.—The manslaughter case of Roscoe C. Arbuckle went to the jury at 4:15 p.m. Arbuckle is accused of having fatally injured Miss Virginia Rappe, a motion picture actress, in the Hotel St. Francis, Sept. 5.

The case has occupied the court for approximately three weeks. Today's entire session was taken up with final arguments, instructions to the jury, and jury deliberations.

Gavin McNab, chief defence counsel, opened the session today with a con-

tinuation of his closing argument. He was followed by Milton U'Ren, assistant district attorney, whose summing up lasted nearly an hour.

The courtroom was crowded throughout the day and the adjoining corridors also held an anxious, crushing crowd. Arbuckle appeared to show deep interest in the arguments.

Asked at the cessation of the final arguments what his future plans were, Arbuckle said he would make no statement, "until the thing is out of the way." The prosecution reiterated its hope for a speedy conviction.

Alternate Juror Hopkins said that the jury had been watched closer than any other in San Francisco for 25 years.

"They censored our mail both incoming and outgoing," he said. "We each had a separate room at the hotel, where we were watched like hawks by four deputy sheriffs."

POULTRY FEATURE OF CITY MARKET

Large Offerings of Turkeys at From 40c to 43c Per Pound.

The local market presented a busy scene on Saturday morning. The square was well filled, and produce of all kinds was offered.

The tables in the basement were filled to capacity. Poultry of all kinds was plentiful.

Dressed chickens sold at \$1.17 1/2 each, and geese at \$1.25 1/2.

Turkeys are becoming more plentiful. Prices ranged from 40¢ to 43¢ per lb.

Strictly new-laid eggs at 80¢ to 90¢, and in some instances 1¢ per dozen was quoted.

Dairy butter in prints sold at 45¢. Fresh pork sold at 15¢ to 16¢ for fronts and 16¢ to 18¢ for hindquarters.

There was very little demand for potatoes. Prices varied, ranging from \$1.00 to \$1.15 per bag; some sold at \$1.50.

Choice apples were offered at \$1.75 per bushel. Grain of all kinds is scarce.

The only demand is for old oats. Barley, per cwt., \$1.40 to \$1.50.

WALL STREET REVIEW

New York, Dec. 2.—The week on the stock exchange was one of the most active this year. Transactions in stocks were unusually large and broad, and the turnover in bonds for each full session was considerably in excess of \$20,000,000.

Prices of stocks tended mainly to higher figures, with rails as the only prominent exceptions. Their failure to advance was attributed to rumors of prospective financing by many of the larger systems.

Steels and equipments assumed leadership of the market, those issues becoming speculative favorites in connection with the proposed merger of various independent producers.

Aside from a temporary rise of call loans to 5 1/2 per cent, December interest and dividend-paying securities began without strain to the money market.

Announcement that the federal government will co-operate with the European countries in the readjustment of foreign exchange stimulated practically all forms of international remittances, some of these advancing to the highest quotations in almost two years.

EXPECT DAILY CABINET WILL REJECT TERMS

Sinn Fein Delegates Hold Out Little Hope of Acceptance.

MAY POSTPONE PARLEY

Delay May Be Asked To Permit Lloyd George To Go To United States.

Dublin, Dec. 2.—Members of the Daily cabinet assembled today to consider the British Government's latest proposals for a Irish peace settlement.

There is little optimism as to its decision, and the Sinn Fein peace delegates who have returned from London are reported as believing the proposed terms will be unacceptable to Eamon de Valera and his advisers.

The exact nature of the proposals are not known publicly, but they are said to be based on an all-Ireland parliamentary government one of the strong points for which the Sinn Fein has been holding out.

Would Define Boundaries.

It is understood, however, that they are required to remain in this parliament at least six months, when she could withdraw at her option. In case of her withdrawal the new terms would be defined by a commission, and she would be restricted to the powers she enjoys at present, while the south of Ireland would be granted full autonomy.

The question of the new terms is that they deal with the Sinn Fein's objection to swearing allegiance to the crown by providing that allegiance be sworn to the Irish free state, the commonwealth of nations known as the British Empire, and to the king as head of that commonwealth of nations.

May Ask Postponement.

In the event the new terms are unacceptable to the daily cabinet, it is believed the Sinn Fein delegates have been asked to present a proposal on behalf of the British government for postponement of the negotiations, not only to allow for a possible adjustment of views but to permit Mr. Lloyd George to make a brief visit to the Washington conference. Continuation of the peace talks is thought to have been a consideration in preparing this alternative.
