WAR VETERAN LOSES LIFE IN ACCIDENT

David Urquhart of Brantford Is Fatally Injured When Team Runs Away.

Special to The Advertiser. Brantford, Sept. 14.—A letter to J. Urquhart of this city from A. H. Leigh of Bounty, Saskatchewan, brings the first details of the accident which cost the life of his son, David Smith Urquhart, who went west on the harvesters' excursion. Mr. Urquhart had apparently got off his wagon to close a gate when the horses started, and in trying to catch them one of them kicked him and threw him under the wagon. Two wheels passed over his body. He had several ribs and his collarbone broken, and probably sustained other internal injuries which were more serious than was at first suspected. The runaway team was seen by neighbors, who later found Mr. Urquhart lying in the road. He was immediately removed to Outlook and placed under medical care, where first reports said his recovery could be expected.

The accident occurred on Sunday, and on Monday word was received that he had passed away. Mr. Urquhart was a veteran of the world war, having served five years in France with the Gordon Highlanders. During the time of his service at the front he received slight wounds and was on one occasion badly gassed. The body is being sent to Brantford, and is expected to arrive Saturday afternoon. The funeral with military honors will be held on Sunday at 2:45 at the home of his parents, 93 East avenue.

DO MARITIMES PLAN TO SECEDE FROM CANADA?

Halifax Man Declares Eastern
Provinces Resent Apparent
Favoritism.

SEEK IMMIGRANTS

That the attitude other provinces take in regard to the development of the Maritimes is resented by people of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and that there is an undercurrent of feeling which points to probable secession, is the statement made by N. Kew, Halifax newspaperman, in London for a few days on vacation. Prevailing discontent in the Maritime Provinces, and rumors that they might annex themselves to the United States, or declare their independence, has impelled N. Kew to tell the truth of conditions as they exist in the extreme eastern section of this country.

Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, with their wealth of coal, iron, gypsum, fisheries and fruit, is a district which, to be developed, needs immigration, said Mr. Kew. "The two provinces are capable of tremendous development, but when the rest of Canada does not support them, but rather entices immigrants to the west, rather than to the rich lands of the east, the two provinces feel they are being overlooked; especially so when Canadian governments have spent money developing the American harbor of Portland, Maine, rather than the ports of Halifax and St. John.

Says Patriotic. "The people in the Maritimes are 100 per cent British," Mr. Kew said. "They are probably the most patriotic people in the Dominion, and are of the English and Scotch type more than all other inhabitants of this country. For this reason, if the opportunities of the Maritime Provinces were advertised in the British Isles, doubtless many more immigrants could be secured from the Old Country."

"Our provinces have been ignored by the rest of the Dominion, and at present there is a feeling in the east which will lead to either secession or annexation, unless their grievances are justified." During this week a meeting of the boards of trade of the Lower Provinces is being held in Halifax, and according to Mr. Kew, if present conditions continue, a climax whereby Canada may lose the Maritimes will be reached this winter.

Feel Isolated. "I know the people of the eastern provinces well," he stated, "and I am sure the last thing they would do would be to leave the Dominion, but at the present time they feel shut out from the country to which they belong."

"Locally, we have been endeavoring to obtain enough money to persuade immigrants to come to our provinces, but we can do little or nothing without the aid of the rest of Canada. The west is securing most of the settlers, and we only a few. "Our ports are not being developed, and millions have been spent by Canadian governments to develop our rival port in Maine. It is not a question for the government," said Mr. Kew, "but for the people of Canada, to demand that through Canadian ports Canadian produce should be carried."

Silk Destroyed Worth Millions

Associated Press Despatch. Aboard Oriental liner President Jefferson, Sept. 14.—Silk worth 400,000,000 yen (\$200,000,000) stored in the Yokohama custom house was destroyed in the disaster of September 1, according to Ray Gehr of the Wanger Company, New York, one of those who escaped. Max D. Kinjasoff, acting American consul at Yokohama, escaped, but lost his life returning to try to rescue his wife, who also was killed.

PROBE IS BELIEVED SURE IN HOME BANK FAILURE

Toronto, Sept. 14.—Home Bank affairs are to come under the searchlight of a government investigation, President H. J. Daly intimated as much today when again pressed for his promised public statement. He was downtown and in answer to a query, said he had better not say anything at present. "There is sure to be an investigation," he said.

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ANNOUNCE OFFICIAL FIGURES IN ELECTION

Report Shows That 940,274
Votes Were Cast in Ontario
Last June.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Sept. 14.—According to official election figures just tabled at the parliament buildings there were 940,274 votes cast in the Ontario election of last June, of which 469,241 went to Conservative candidates, 198,235 to Liberals, 207,691 to U. F. O. candidates, and 23,167 to independent. Although the Conservatives have a majority of 58 members they fell a thousand short of securing a majority of the votes. Of the 111 members elected, 32 were elected on a minority of votes cast; 19 of them being Conservatives, 8 were U. F. O., 4 were Liberals and 1 independent.

WINDSORITE CHARGED WITH HAVING NARCOTICS

Special to The Advertiser. Windsor, Sept. 14.—Following the receipt of a report from the provincial analyst that a quantity of white powder seized at the home of H. H. Samuels, wealthy east-end businessman, was a mixture containing both heroin and morphine, a charge was filed today against Samuels of having narcotics in his possession. At the time the white powder was seized, Samuels declared it was harmless, and that in purchasing it he had been duped. The case will be heard in the police court Monday.

TEMPERANCE MOVEMENT IS PROGRESSING IN EUROPE

Associated Press Despatch. Toronto, Sept. 14.—According to Rev. Ben H. Spence, secretary of the Dominion Alliance, who has just returned to Toronto after attending conferences in London and Copenhagen, the temperance movement is making marked progress in Europe. He stated he was surprised at the progress made by the "dry" campaign, and expressed himself as

strongly in hope that the whole world would soon be under prohibition laws.
