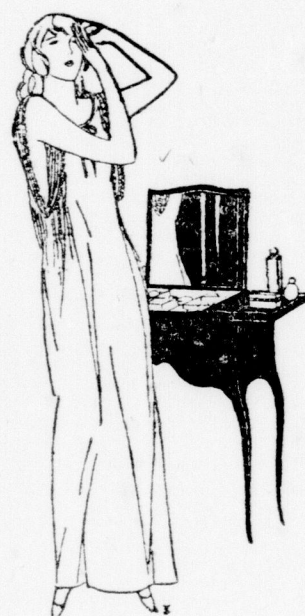

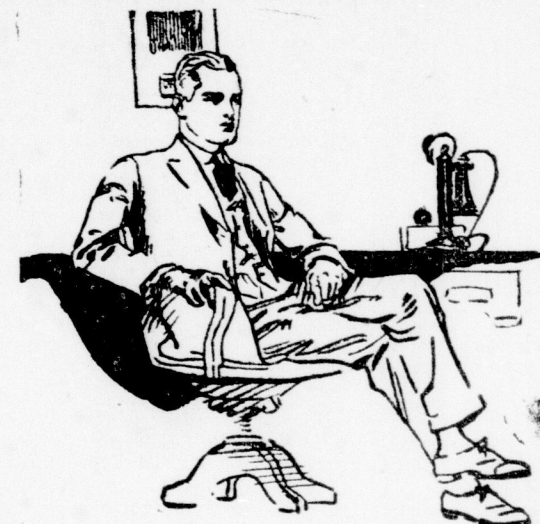

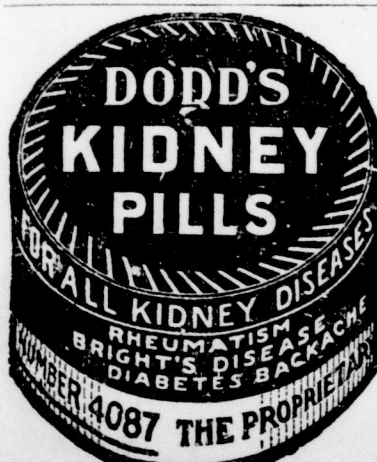

agitated lobbies of parliament turned
to discussion of possible dark horses.

E. V. Thomson Used Binder
Twine and Ladder in
Rash Act.

Stratford, June 12.—E. V. Thom-
son, Mornington Township, a young
Dane employed on the farm of Al-
fred Isley, committed suicide by
hanging himself because he thought
that someone in Denmark was steal-
ing the affections of his sweetheart.
He used a piece of binder twine, at-
tached to a ladder leading to the
mows, to commit the rash act.
At the foot of the ladder on the
floor two letters were lying, together
with a fountain pen. One letter was
addressed to his father and one to
his sweetheart. They were written
in the Danish tongue and a Dane
from a nearby farm was pressed
into service to read them when Cor-
oner Dr. J. D. Monteith and County
Constable Hutchinson arrived on the
scene. While the interpreter could
not speak very good English, it was
gathered that the young man had
received some intimation at any

HEWITT IS GIVEN
LIGHT SENTENCE

Londoner Is Given 3 Months
To Two Years On Having
Stolen Goods.

Allan Hewitt, who was convicted
last week by a county court jury of
having stolen goods in his posses-
sion, was yesterday sentenced by
Judge Talbot Macbeth to from three
months to two years in the Ontario
reformatory at Guelph. Hewitt took
the sentence calmly.
Hewitt faced the more serious
charge of breaking into and enter-
ing a C. N. R. freight car at Strath-
roy on April 23, 1922, but after de-
liberated over an hour the jury ex-
onerated him, but found him guilty
of being in possession of stolen
goods. Neither did the jury find him
guilty of theft generally, as charged
by the crown.
Officers visited the Packer grocery
store at Horton and Clarence streets,
shortly after the robbery and found
there certain articles which had
formed a part of the freight car con-
tents. Mrs. Packer gave evidence to
the effect that Hewitt had visited the
store before the officers arrived, leav-
ing the packages of merchandise. On
the stand Hewitt denied that he left
the articles.
The prisoner had had his case ad-
judged from time to time, and for
more than a year was out on bail ow-
ing to ill-health.
W. S. Brewster, K.C., of Brantford,
prosecuted at the trial, while J. M.
McEvoy, K.C., of this city, was the
defence counsel.

POSTIES TO VOTE
ON STRIKE ISSUE

Decision Reached in Mass
Meeting of Postal Clerks
At Toronto.

Toronto, June 12.—A decision to
take a vote today on the question of
whether to accept the new wage
schedule announced this week or to
launch a strike was reached at a
mass meeting of the postal clerks' union held early this morning in the
Labor Temple.
There were 600 or more men present
and they were guided in their
course by the advice given by a
number of the executive of the Postal
Federation of Canada who were
present. It was stated after the
meeting, which was a secret one,
that similar votes would be taken
throughout the various postal centers
in Canada within the next few days,
and that, if the majority declares for
a strike, it will probably go into ef-
fect early next week.

VAIN ATTEMPT IS MADE
TO PREVENT MAN'S SUICIDE

Vancouver, B.C., June 12.—After a
struggle with his wife and fourteen-
year-old son, who attempted to
frustrate his apparent intention to
commit suicide, William Parker, 65,
last night succeeded in drinking a
quantity of carbolic acid and
cutting his throat with a razor, ac-
cording to the story told by Mrs.
Parker. The man died within a few
minutes.
