WILL CASE HEARD

An unusual case came before
His Honor Judge Reade in the
Surrogate Court, last Thursday.

The action was brought to have
it determined whether or not two
certain documents purporting to
be the wills of the deceased Fr-
erick W. Bender, were or either of
them was valid.

This is called proving a will in
solemn form, and is necessarily
resorted to when the will cannot
be proven in the usual informal
way by affidavits, by reason of
some questions arising as to whether
or not the formalities, pro-
vided by the Wills Act, for the
execution of same, have been
complied with.

Owing to some authorities be-
ing cited by counsel pertinent to
the points in question, the matter
was taken under consideration by
the Judge.

It would appear that the diffi-
culties arising in the case are ow-
ing to people trying to be their
own lawyers and attempting to
do things that require study and
training for their performance.

Mr. J. C. Haight appeared in
Counsel in the matter and pre-
sented all news of the case, no
one appearing in opposition.

as the roads were deep with drifts.

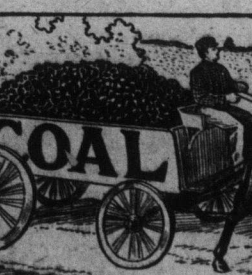
