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CANADA'S ORATOR.

What an American Thinks of Mr. Blake's Speaking.

Mr. Blake made a speech at St. Stephen, N. B., on the border of the United States. Among those who heard him was the editor of the Times, published in the neighboring American town of Calais, Maine. The opinion of the Times' editor is, therefore, interesting. He says: "The speech of the Hon. Edward Blake in St. Stephen, Monday, was one of the most masterly we have ever heard of. For two hours he held the attention of his hearers by his pure diction, powerful analysis and irresistible logic. Attempting not to over-elaborate his speech, he kept to the main point, and carried conviction by masterly presentation of facts. His dispassionate argument was a surprise to those who have been accustomed to listen to the inflated oratory of campaign speakers on this side of the line. A few such men as Mr. Blake would purify the methods of public discussion in the United States. Canada has not only produced a great mind, but a true gentleman in Mr. Blake."

"I tell you it's enough to make a man a demon," he said; "father, mother, sister, wife, and all, and an and wife killed, and one blow. Remember that little mother; she was a bigger 'un' than you, but she could do anything with me. I remember she came to me and leaned over and kissed me, and said, 'Well, there's a kiss from your mother, lad,' and when I came back she had me in the door with a hole in her skull, killed by her red devil. Oh! I've had a scalp for every drop of blood they spilled that day," he continued. "I took an oath that as long as I could kill through the hind sight of a rifle I'd kill every Sioux Indian I got a chance to shoot at."
