## FIRST MEETING OF NEW COUNCIL

thrash it out with Mr. Dimock. Councillor White said that it was the wish of the council and also the wish of the citizens to avoid litigation, and the doubt existed in his mind whether we could collect this fee of \$200. Was there not a provincial statute fixing the fee at \$50? If that was the case they had better go slow in the matter.

Town Solicitor McKenzie being asked his opinion said that he felt sure we had the right to collect if the fee was considered reasonable, and there was no discrimination, and was of opinion that the provincial statutes which governed other towns were not the same as our own which had a special incorporation act.

To bring the matter to a head councillor Miller moved in amendment that the matter be referred to the Police and License committee. Seconded by councillor Ellsworth on a vote the amendment was lost by the casting vote of the Mayor. For the amendment councillors Miller, Ellsworth, White and Ferguson 4. Against it councillors Pinaut, Alexander, Lunan and Quinn 4. On the casting vote of the Mayor the amendment was defeated. The same voting applied to the motion to file the letter.

Communication read from Town Engineer R. J. S. Sly for one week leave of absence. Granted as one councillor put it "under circumstances over which he had no control".

Communication read from W. D. Lighthall, secretary of Union of Canadian Municipalities asking that a resolution be passed with regard to an interprovincial highway from coast to coast.

Councillor Pinaut thought it should be proper on our part to pass this resolution and do something further as it was likely there would be strong action on the part of St. John people to have this road go through the St. John Valley. Other members concurred in this view and after discussion the resolution was passed with the rider that in the opinion of this council the proposed road should follow the line of St. Lawrence River and Intercolonial Railway along the Bay Chaleur to Bathurst thence along the I.C.R. to Moncton. Copies of this resolution were ordered to be sent to the councils and Boards of Trade in the various towns interested, and that they be asked to join together in sending one or two strong delegates to the convention which takes place in Saskatoon in July.

Communication was received from H. G. V. Farrar, manager of Electric Light department with regard to a number of shacks on Water St., which were still being supplied with electric light at a flat rate of 2 cents per light, and recommended that all these places have meters put in. Matter referred to Electric Light committee.

Communication from L. T. Joudry with reference to flooding of his property owing to inadequate sewers was referred to Water and Sewerage committee.

Communication from Alexander Lumbe enclosing plan of proposed water was discussed and referred to Public Property and Streets committee.

Petitions from Wm. S. Young and Felix LeCouffe for trucking licenses were referred to Police and License committee.

Board of Health accounts to the amount of \$112 were ordered paid. The Electric Light committee were authorised to purchase two arc lamps and time switch for the government wharf and a battery charging set at a price not to exceed \$250.

Councillor White from Electric Light committee submitted report recommending that the request of A. C. Bellisle for light and power in his premises outside the town limits be granted on consideration of a three year agreement being signed, the sum to be paid annually to be not less than \$25. Report received and adopted.

Councillor Pinaut brought up the matter of O'Leary St., again. He said everybody was anxious to see

this matter finished once and for all, and stated that correspondence had been exchanged with W. J. O'Leary and a delegation had gone to Montreal to see if they could get the thing decided. O'Leary would give the same deed as had been before the council in previous years which was for the whole or none. All that the town was interested in at the present time was that part from Duke to Gerrard and in order to have the deal settled he moved that the last clause (with relation to deed of O'Leary St.) in the resolution to purchase of the Ellsworth property be deleted.

Quite a discussion was raised on question and in the end councillor White seconded the motion which carried. Councillor Alexander from Water and Sewerage committee submitted report recommending payment of accounts totalling \$366.98 also submitted contract with Shives Lumber Co. with relation to the installation of the sprinkler system. Both reports were received and adopted. In a further report Councillor Alexander submitted plan and estimated cost of new sewer at the subway. This plan was in accordance with the authority now vested in the Committee to provide another sewer outlet at McRae Hollow. This new sewer would drain an area of 2 1-5 miles. The estimated cost \$1848.80. The plan was accepted and committee authorized to proceed with the work when the necessary titles to the subway were received.

His Worship drew the attention of the public charities committees to the fact that the infant child of a woman prisoner was in Dalhousie jail, and the sheriff had notified the town to prepare accommodation for it. Some councillors made the remark that the sheriff had no right to allow the child to be taken there in the first place.

Councillor White promised to look into the matter of a meter for Mr. Farnsworth's house.

In reply to a question the Town Clerk stated that the Petros matter, was to be brought before Judge Matheson on Thursday.

Council then adjourned.

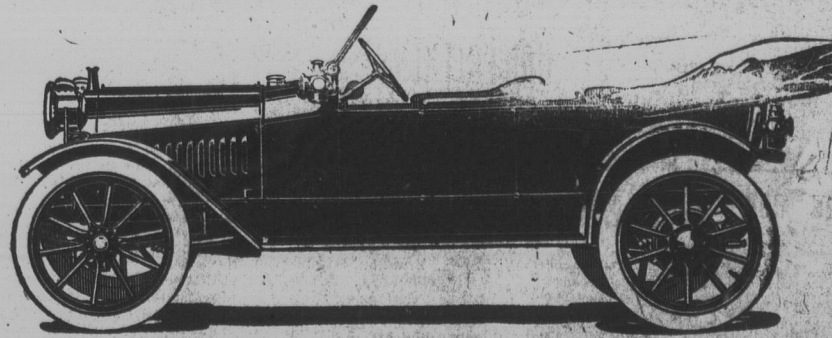
