R. talked once and held their opponents to their former mark thus tying the score. When the railway nine failed to score in the first half of the fifth the game looked like a draw but the High School boys chalked up another run in their half making the score 7-8 in their favor.

The fielders of both teams did good work making some neat catches. The basemen of both squads were very alert throughout the game and put over some snappy plays, although several slips also occurred. C. Duncan did good work behind the plate for the C. N. R. squad while F. Roy on the mound showed up in fine form, striking out thirteen batters. L. Watson, tossing the pill for the C. H. S. delivered some fine ball. He is evidently a coming twirler. L. Jamieson performed his duties as backstop very satisfactorily and took good care in throwing to basemen.

High School Nine Wins Again

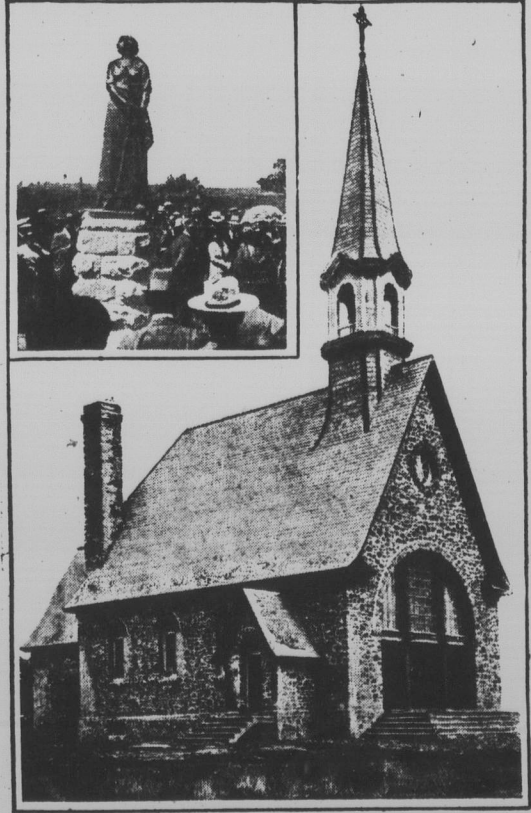
