WRECK OF THE ASIA.

FRIDAY MORNING, SEPTEMBER 27. 1882,

Search Party Proceeds to the Scene of the Wreck.

RECOVERY OF DEAD BODIES.

The Inquest—Miss Morrison's Graphic Ac-count of the Wreck—Out on the Bay in an Open Bost—A Young Girl's Cour-

PARRY Sound, Sept. 21-I have jus sturned from the vicinity of the supposed wreck of the steamer Asia. As you have already been informed, the Northern Belle, of the Great Northern Transit company,

did we find anything belonging to the Asia.

ARRIVING AT POINT AU BARRIE we anchored our yacht and took a small skiff we had in tow and spending the balance of the day in exploring the numerous islands in that vicinity with a hope of finding some more of the bodies, the shups cargo, or the books of the purser, so as to arrive at the names of the persons who perished on the illfated steamer. Very little wreckage of any kind was found on the shore, only a few pieces of the upper works of the steamer being cast upon the rocks. The shore line from Point au Barrie to the French river is composed of very inhospitable rocks, islands and shoals and deep bays stretch for into the shore at intervals the entire distance, about 60 miles.

A Protest Against Prohibition.

CINCINNATI, Sept 21—The National distillers' and liquor dealers' association adopted the following:—Whereas we have by yielding obedience to the most oppressive laws imposed upon any business interest in the country, given abundant evidence of our being a law abiding community of citizens. Resolved, we are in favor of yielding equal obedience to the unwritten law of the land, which impels sobriety, good order and respect for the opinions and customs of all good citizens. We are in favor of the sales of spirits heing placed on the same footing as other merchandise. We favor a judicious license system throughout the country, which shall equally benefit the government and afford us protection and enforcement of all the laws pertaining to the propes favaticism and prohibition as detrimental to the rights of the majority of American citizens, and consider it the duty of all members of the association to oppose such legislation in all places and at all times. We make no political ties or requirements as an association, but leave it to the members to act according to their own judgment and interest. A Protest Against Prohibition

THE RICHELIEU BLOWN UP EN ROUTE FOR LACHINE.

PRICE ONE CENT

Three Men Killed and One Missing-Sev-

eral Passengers Severely Scalded -Full Particulars. LACHINE, Que., Sept. 21-A dreadful ecident occurred this morning on board the ferry steamer Richelieu, while on her way from Chateaugusy to this port, three men being killed and one missing. The names of the unfortunate victims are Pierre Duquette, pilot; James Richardson and Persellius Ameit of Chateauguay, farmers. The missing man is a son of Daquetta the pilot, and is supposed to have been blown over board by the explesion. Several of the passengers were severely scalded by the escap-

ing steam. The cause of the accident is at

present unknown. FURTHER PACTS. MONTREAL, Sept. 21. - There was great excitement in the city to-day when it was blown up and that several lives were lost. The facts as developed by visiting the scene of the datastrophy are as follows: She had not gone far, however, when it appears the water jacket that surrounds the killed and the following person severely scalded: James Muir, J.
Lamberg, Dolard Picard, all of Chattaugusy, and Emily Blanchard of St. Martine dangerously scalded and burned. An Indian was also severely scalded. The engineer, Michael Frechette, sustained a good deal of injury about the head and face from the fire but will recover. An inquest has been opened, when all the facts will come out. It is generally believed about the accident arose from the water jacket having corroded in the inside from age and neglect. There were only 32 pounds of steam on at the time of the accident.
