WRECK OF THE ASIA.

A Search Party Proceeds to the Scene of the Wreck.

RECOVERY OF DEAD BODIES.

The Inquest—Miss Morrison's Graphic Account of the Wreck—On the Bay in an Open Boat—A Young Girl's Course.

PARRY SOUND, Sept. 21.—I have just returned from the vicinity of the supposed wreck of the steamer Asia. As you have already been informed, the Northern Belle, of the Great Northern Transit company, the tug Susan B. Doty and a sailboat containing three special constables, sworn in by Judge McCurdy, were on Monday morning last, in the Belle to unload at Shawanaga, about six miles from where the wreckage of the wreck came ashore; the Doty being in the lead, followed by the Northern Belle and their more savage, though less conscientious brethren, the half-breeds, who have been hovering around the scene of the wreck, like a flock of vultures on the lookout for prey. I accompanied the special constables.

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LAST OF THE STRUGGLE.

PROPOSED CONCENTRATED ATTACK ON DAMIETTA.

Fanaticism in Cairo—Surrender of the British—Abolition of Abdallah De-

FEARFUL CONCENTRATED ATTACK ON DAMIETTA. London, Sept. 21.—A Fort Said despatch says in obedience to an order from Yacoub Pasha, the garrison of Damietta has resolved to lay down arms and depart to their homes. Abdallah and Abdolatif Pasha left Damietta with a small escort. Mustapha is going in the direction of Cairo. The report of the killing of Abdallah by his troops seems to have been untrue.

FANATICISM IN CAIRO. Cairo, Sept. 21.—The fanatic sectarians are sulky and defiant except in the presence of the British soldiers. The former have spread a report that fifty thows and Russians are on their way to Egypt to drive out the English.

DAMIETTA REFUSES TO SURRENDER. The garrison of Damietta still refuses to surrender.

CONCENTRATED ATTACK ON DAMIETTA. Alexandria, Sept. 21.—The troops under Gen. Wood go to Damietta to-morrow to demand its surrender. Admiral Dowell, with several vessels, will blockade the coast near Damietta simultaneously with Gen. Wood's advance.

PORT SAID SURRENDERED. Port Said, Sept. 21.—Fort Ghemlich has surrendered. A garrison of only 90 men remained. The force was to Damietta last evening.

DEATH OF COMMANDER RAWSON. Malta, Sept. 21.—Commander Rawson, who was promoted for bravery at the battle of Tel-el-Kebir, in which he was wounded, died today. Rawson accompanied the Arctic expedition of 1875-76.

PUNISHMENT OF A BARBERSHOP. Rome, Sept. 21.—A court-martial has condemned Felice, a lieutenant in the Italian army, who deserted to serve with Arabi, to two years imprisonment and dismissal from the army on discharge.

ARABI'S LITTLE REGULATION. The examination of the treasury proves that £200,000 sterling were taken by Arabi, of which £18,000 were discovered at the War office. It is probable that other details will be found in the Department of the Interior.

NOTES. Several fresh arrests were made yesterday at Alexandria, including Said Bey.

Nearly all the garrison of Fort Ghemlich fled across Lake Manzaleh before the surrender.

The British gunboats have proceeded from Ghemlich in the direction of Port Said and Damietta.

CABLE NOTES. The last of the suspects was released from Kilmishnah jail yesterday.

FIRE. Norwich, Sept. 21.—A disastrous fire occurred here about 1 o'clock this morning, totally destroying a building, owned by the National Bank of Canada, which was formerly used as a laundry and more recently as a carpenter shop in connection with the new building on Main street. The building and contents were valued at \$300.

Bishop Elect of Pontiac. Montreal, Sept. 21.—The consecration of the bishop elect of Pontiac took place today in Notre Dame church. The priest was assisted by the bishop-elect of Montreal, Mgr. Nadeau, and Mgr. Nadeau, a Montrealer by birth. He was educated at the St. Theresa college and afterwards acted as curate of a parish in the United States. Returning to Canada in the spring of 1870 he took the office of vicar under the care of Mgr. Hebert, but eighteen months ago, on the death of Vicar-General Morin, father Lorrain became vicar-general for the diocese of Montreal. Now he has been raised to the episcopate and although he is hardly 40 years of age his great learning has given him a very high reputation among his colleagues, over whom he has been raised. He is not Bishop of Pontiac, as might be supposed, for no bishop can be appointed for an district which has had no bishop before. Bishop Fabre of Montreal officiated, wearing his golden mitre and richly embroidered robes and carrying the pastoral cross. Archbishop Taschereau of Quebec, occupied a seat under a canopy on the west side of the altar.

Protest Against Prohibition. Cincinnati, Sept. 21.—The National distillers and liquor dealers' association adopted the following—Whereas we have by yielding obedience to the most oppressive law imposed upon any business interest in the country given abundant evidence of our being a law abiding community of citizens. Resolved, we are in favor of yielding equal obedience to the unwritten law of the land, which impels society, good order and respect for the opinions and customs of all good citizens. We are in favor of the sales of spirits being placed on the same footing as other merchandise. We favor a judicious license system throughout the country, which shall equally benefit the government and afford us protection and enforcement of all the laws pertaining to the proper government of cities and towns. We oppose fanaticism and prohibition as detrimental to the rights of the majority of American citizens and consider it the duty of all members of the association to oppose such legislation in all places and at all times. We make no political ties or requirements in an association, but leave it to the members to act according to their own judgment and interest.

The Turko-Greek Question. Constantinople, Sept. 21.—It is stated that certain powers, including Germany, have declined to consider a proposal to refer the Turko-Greek frontier question to a conference of ambassadors.

A Church Trial. McKeesport, Pa., Sept. 21.—A short time since a man named Convis was brought before a committee of the Methodist church charged with the non-payment of his dues. After an investigation by the committee it was adjudged that the defendant was unable to pay.

A Fight Between Jeckers. Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Sept. 21.—At the county fair this afternoon, during a trotting race, Henry White and Wm. Sargeant, drivers, were seen to strike each other with their whips and Sargeant was thrown from his seat. He held to the lines and regained his seat. When the horses reached the stand Sargeant struck White several times on the head with the butt-end of his whip, knocking him between the horse and the sulky, and the horse kicked him once or twice, but he was rescued without serious danger. White's friends then attempted to mob Sargeant, but he was gotten out of the way.

ANOTHER SHIP ACCIDENT.

THE RICHELIEU BLOWN UP EN ROUTE FOR LACHINE.

Three Men Killed and One Missing—Several Passengers Severely Scalded—Full Particulars.

LACHINE, Que., Sept. 21.—A dreadful accident occurred this morning on board the ferry steamer Richelieu, while on her way from Chateaugay to Lachine, when it was being blown up and one missing. The names of the unfortunate victims are Pierre Duquette, pilot; James Richardson and Perseus Amoit of Chateaugay, farmers. The missing man is a son of Duquette the pilot, and is supposed to have been blown overboard by the explosion. Several of the passengers were severely scalded by the escaping steam. The cause of the accident is at present unknown.

FOUR MEN KILLED. Montreal, Sept. 21.—There was great excitement in the city to-day when it was known that the old steamer Richelieu had been blown up and that several lives were lost. The facts as developed by visiting the scene of the catastrophe are as follows: The steamer in question, which was lately placed on the ferry, left the south side of the river at 7 a.m. on her way to Lachine. She had not gone far, however, when it appeared the water jacket that surrounds the funnel collapsed and caused the explosion. Captain Duquette, James Richardson of Chateaugay, and Perseus Amoit of Mile End, Montreal, were instantly killed and the following persons severely scalded: James Muir, J. Langberg, Doland Poirer, all of Chateaugay and Emory Richardson, pilot. The latter was severely scalded and burned. An Indian was also severely scalded. The engineer, Michael Froehner, sustained a good deal of injury about the head and face from the fire but will recover. An inquest has been opened, when all the facts will come out. He was a very good fellow and was well liked by all who knew him.
