TREASON AND DYNAMITE.

THE BLOWING UP OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AT GLASGOW.

Ten Prisoners on Trial at Edinburgh—Evidence in the Prosecution—A Scene in Court.

EDINBURGH, Dec. 17.—The names of the men brought from Glasgow for trial on a charge of participation in the dynamite explosion at Glasgow.

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FARMING IN QU'APPELLE.

REMARKABLE SUCCESS OF THE PICKERING SYNDICATE.

Good Crops—What is Necessary for Success—Two Hundred Farm Houses in Sight.

In an interview with Mr. Williamson, now resident on Suffolk place in this city, formerly of Downsville, was obtained the following valuable information concerning the Pickering syndicate.

Last year a company composed of Angus McKay, Wm. Williamson, Robert Miller and Edward Boone, landowners in Pickering township, Ontario county, went North-west and located nearly 5000 acres of land in the Qu'Appelle valley.

The syndicate, which was composed of the above named gentlemen, was organized in the month of May, 1882.

For the purpose of the syndicate, a number of employees, confined their operations during the last year to building dwellings and stables, and to breaking the land.

During the winter Mr. E. H. Williamson, a son of the above, remained in charge of the stock, etc., and so pleased with the climate that he settled on property of his own in the vicinity.

Last March the entire company went up to the Qu'Appelle valley and farm implements.

Sowing the grain began the first week in April, but owing to the late season, the crops were not very early.

But the warm July and August, coupled with the long and sunny season, ultimately yielded a bountiful harvest.

The yield from the land that had been broken last year was as follows: Wheat, 44 bushels of seed, or an average of 44 bushels to the acre.

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HEROISM AT A FIRE.

Three Women Carried Out of a Burning Building Yesterday.

At 11 o'clock yesterday morning a fire broke out in the paper pattern room of J. S. Hughes on the third story of the West-ern Assurance buildings, Wellington street east.

A boy dropping a lighted match among some paper caused the fire. On the top floor of the building lives Mr. Murphy and family, the caretakers.

TRIAL OF THE LOTTERY AGENTS AND PROMOTERS.

One Man Fined for Selling Tickets—The Charge Against Murphy as Promoter Adjudged Until To-day.

GUELPH, Dec. 17.—The Guelph lottery cases were up on trial this afternoon. County Attorney Peterson appeared for the crown and Coffee & Coffee for the defendants.

The first case called was that of E. L. Gale, who on evidence of G. Hutchison Gale, was found guilty of selling tickets and fined \$20 and costs.

Among the witnesses called were Col. Higginbotham, ex-trustee, who swore that he had resigned, but that his name had since been used without his permission.

Edward O'Connor swore he was now a trustee. He did not know what his duties as trustee were. His fellow trustees were the F. J. Chadwick and A. McQuillan. The F. J. Chadwick swore to receive duties of the trustees. At any rate they did so. They received. [Laughter.]

The magistrate strongly denounced the scheme. The case against J. L. Murphy as promoter was adjourned until Tuesday.
