WITH THE PRESBYTERIANS.

THE SIXTH DAY PROCEEDINGS OF THE ALLIANCE.

The Chinese Exclusion Question—Fire-arms and Liquor For Pacific Islanders—International Emigration—There is No Statement of Doctrine Among the Pan-Prebyterianians—They are Simply Protestants Reformers.

There was a large attendance of delegates and visitors when the sixth day's proceedings of the Pan-Prebyterian Alliance were opened yesterday morning at 10 o'clock.

Dr. De Bann of Fonda, N.Y., presented a special report recommending the appointment of a committee to enter into correspondence with the Reformed and Presbyterian Churches of the United States...

Mr. De Bann, representing the Dutch Reformed Church of South Africa, was introduced to the meeting. He said that the church which he represented was awakening to mission work and was putting its resources more and more into the work of the heart of Africa.

Mr. De Bann also arrived in the city yesterday morning, having been in New York 18 days in quarantine in New York, notwithstanding that there were no cases of cholera on board his vessel.
