HAYWARD KILLED FOUR PEOPLE.

The Confession He Made the Night Before His Execution—Miss Gung His Last Victim.

New York, Dec. 19.—The morning papers print the following special from Minneapolis, Minn.: "Harry Hayward, an anti-murderer, dictated to a stenographer the night before his execution, contains his confession of the Gung murder, and also the information that he committed three murders before that crime. Hayward said in his confession that he never got into trouble until he began to gamble. This led him into a band of confidence men, with whom he associated for some time, but he never spent much of the green goods. It was too risky."

At El Paso, Del Norte he got mixed up with a girl and shot her brother. Hayward said the first murder he committed was in San Francisco in 1883, when he killed a Chinaman who had cheated him at cards. He next shot an adventurer at Pasadena and robbed her of \$500. The buildings are constructed of white brick and Cleveland stone and are finished with the same elegant Gothic style of architecture as the main building. The architect was the late Mr. J. H. St. John, a well-known local architect.
